The ship was placed in commission at the Navy Yard, Boston, Mass., by Rear Admiral R. A. THEOBALD, USN, Commandant of the First Naval District and of the Navy Yard, Boston, Mass., by authority of VCNO Confidential Mailgram 121350 Dated 14 August 1943. Commander Harold T. DEUTERMANN, U.S. Navy, took command pursuant to orders of the Chief of Naval Personnel dated 14 May 1943.

Present at the commissioning were Mrs. Frances E. Cogswell, wife of the late Captain F. E. COGSWELL, USN, one of the co-sponsors, and Captain R. C. GRADY, USN, Captain of the Yard. The blessing was

pronounced by Chaplain J. E. KJELDAHL (Chc) USNR, Admiral THEOBALD and Commander DEUTERMANN each made a short address to the ship's company.

The non-annotated information and events contained herein, was provided by a shipmate that served on the USS COGSWELL during the period 17 August 1943 – February 1946. Annotated information is noted in the form of a superscript number which references the source and is listed in the back of this book. A different font has also been used to distinguish between sources.

**17 August 1943** Boston - U.S.S. COGSWELL commissioned (DD-651).

**17 August 1943** – USS Cogswell is commissioned at the Charleston Navy Yard – Cile, Mom, Dad, and Billy come aboard.<sup>2</sup>

**26 August to 03 September** - On trial runs, when not in port.

**03 September** – After making several trial runs in and outside of Boston harbor, finally left for shakedown cruise to Bermuda. We hit the tail end of a hurricane the day before our arrival. Lots of the boys quite sick.<sup>2</sup>

**04 September** - Underway for shakedown cruise in Bermuda. Encountered the tail end of a hurricane in route to Bermuda. Over half the crew got sick.

**06 Sept** - Arrived in Hamilton, Bermuda.

**08-11 Sept** - Underway during day - in harbor at night.

**12 Sept** - Underway for a sub hunt, which was reported in area. No Luck.

**13 Sept** - 06 Oct - Fired A.A. practices, took speed runs.

**September – 06 October** – Operated in and out of Bermuda. Managed to get one liberty at Hamilton. Not much to see except Limies, Darkies, and short patrol. Got in battle with shore patrol but outnumbered them so made out pretty good. Couple of the boys banged up, but nobody in brig. Farrace was caught trying to bring liquor onboard.<sup>2</sup>

**07 Oct** - Completed shakedown. Underway for Boston.

**09 Oct** - Arrived Boston.

**16 Oct** – Left Boston for Norfolk VA. Passed through Cape Cod Canal on way down. Very pretty sight.<sup>2</sup>

**17 Oct** - Underway for Norfolk, Va. - encountered a severe storm.

**19 Oct** – Bartell<sup>2</sup>

Written Tuesday, October 19, 1943

Dear Mom and Dad,

Well back to sea again and I can't say that I'm sorry. I trained most of the last couple of days we were in port so might as well get out where the water is under the ship and not on top.

It was really rough for the first day and as usual most of the fellows were sick. That's one time you don't see many officers - I wonder why.

I'm sorry that I can't tell you where I'm at but maybe Cile has guessed it by this time. I got a letter from Sil Peluso today and he is still at Annapolis. He's now striking for carpenter. He seems to like it quite a lot and says that he sees quite a few of the fellows that we went through boot with. I haven't seen a one as yet, but I am looking.

What's the latest from Joe? I sure hope that he will be able to get home for Christmas, if he can get out of the woods long enough.

By the way I haven't as yet been able to buy the shoes but will as soon as possible.

It's getting harder and harder to write especially when one does the same things every day and goes no place but I guess you realized that so please make allowances for it.

Well I'll close now but will write again soon. Thanks for everything and lots of love to all,

**19 Oct** - Arrived in Norfolk, Va.

**20 Oct** - Underway for the day with group of trainees.

**23 Oct** - Underway for Trinidad.

**23 Oct** - Left Norfolk for a trip to Trinidad. Trip uneventful.<sup>2</sup>

**25 Oct** - Made sub contact, tried to ram her and dropped depth charges. Our men forgot that the new regulations required depth charges to be set on safety.

**26 Oct** - Arrived in Trinidad for overnight stay. No liberty. Rained like hell.<sup>2</sup>

**27 Oct** - Underway for states with Carrier.

**01 Nov** - Arrived Norfolk, Va.

**01-13 Nov** - Back in Norfolk. Escorted an aircraft carrier back. Lots of liberty during this stay. Sorry now that I didn't have Cile come down but didn't know at the time just how long we would be in port. Called her up on Nov 5<sup>th</sup>. Quite drunk I guess. Old Rocking Chair with Sherry wine chaser. Had to drag Bill Farrace back. Started out with J. Kapaczynski, E Brower, Bill, and myself to celebrate my 25<sup>th</sup> birthday.<sup>2</sup>

**06 Nov** - Bartell<sup>2</sup>

Sunday, Nov. 6, 1943

Dear Mom and Dad,

Got your letter of the 4th today. It's the first one that I've received since Tuesday. The mail must be held up somewhere cause usually I manage to get one every day when we are in port.

Well if I have as much fun in the next 25 years as I've had in the last I won't kick a bit. I hope that I haven't made too many enemies; I don't think so. I know that with the exception of one person I don't regret having met any of the people I know.

Gee it doesn't seem that Joe has been in the army for a whole year. The time sure goes fast doesn't it.

It's too bad about Floyd and Warner but it was bound to happen sooner or later. If I was Dad I would hold on as long as possible and get as much out of it as I could. As long as there is money in it, I'd grab it.

We managed to celebrate pretty good yesterday. Myself and three other boys went out together and they wouldn't let me pay for a thing. We had to go to the P.O. to get a ration card before we could buy any liquor. We had spaghetti and then went out to drink and then to a show. I called up Cile about 1 o'clock and got her out of bed. I couldn't hear her very good tho.

I suppose that you folks will be shoveling snow pretty soon. It's mighty chilly down here nights but the days are fairly warm.

I don't know what's next on the program but I am hoping just as hard as I can that we might assist in the invasion of Europe. Wouldn't that be something.

Well I'll close now with all my love and hope to see you soon.

**08-09 Nov** - Out to sea for firing runs.

**10 Nov** - Back in port.

**12 Nov** - Underway with Iowa - Destination unknown. (Unknown to us, President Roosevelt was on the Iowa. He was on his way to Yalta for a conference with Churchill and Stalin. The destroyer Porter accidentally fired a torpedo at the Iowa. It missed, only by 50 yards. Commodore Chillingsworth almost had kittens.

PORTER FIRES ON IOWA

"OFFICER TELLS HOW TORPEDO FIRED IN ERROR NEARLY STRUCK ROOSEVELT'S BATTLESHIP."

Miami, Fla., March 15-(AP) - One of the most embarrassing experiences of World War II was recalled here today at a reunion of survivors of the destroyer William D. Porter.

By accident, they fired a torpedo at the battleship Iowa when it was taking the late President Roosevelt to the Tehran conference with Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin in 1943.

At the time, the Navy didn't say anything about it, "recalled Lt. Seward Lewis, of Miami."

### **Ship put under arrest**

"I think the first time the story was released was when the Porter was sunk in the Pacific by a Japanese suicide plane. And there was only a bare mention of it then." Lewis was a lieutenant aboard the Porter. At the time of the torpedo firing mistake which almost made history he was serving officer of the day. President Roosevelt' Admiral Ernest King, the chief of naval operations, and many other VIPs were on the Iowa, he related. The Porter was one of the ships in the screen."

"Just as we were approaching Gibraltar, the Iowa started some training exercises, firing at balloons and stuff, and all of the destroyers were taking part. We were using the Iowa as a target for a simulated torpedo attack. The skipper ordered, Fire one, fire two, fire three. When we fired No. 3 a fully armed torpedo shot right toward the No. 2 magazine of the Iowa."

"Someone had forgotten to disarm No. 3. When the switch was closed on that one, it went."

### **Screams into Radio**

"We gave the danger signal of four short blasts on the whistle, and I was screaming into the radio : "Lion, lion, lion (code of the Iowa), come, right come hard right!" The Iowa, finally lumbered around out of the way and the torpedo harmlessly past, Lewis said."

A.J. Fazio of Key West, Fla., was a chief torpedoman on another battery of the port side tubes, explained that the torpedo could explode only on hitting a solid object and was equipped with a device to stop it if it failed to hit its target.

Lewis reminisced: "When everybody finally realized what happened, the language from the Iowa to the destroyer division commander wasn't fit to print."

"Our whole ship was put under arrest - the only time ever heard of that happening in the Navy - and we were ordered back to Bermuda."

Lewis said "a Navy board investigated and looked for all sorts of red herrings and communist stuff but found none."

"Some of the officers received letters of reprimand, he recalled, but that was all that ever came of it."

The Inquirer, Washington, March 15, 1958 (UP)-

The Navy admitted today that one its destroyers accidentally fired a live torpedo during the Second World War at a battleship carrying President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his wartime high

command. It missed by 50 yards. Lt H. Seward Lewis, a former officer of the destroyer Porter disclosed the Navy's embarrassing secret. He was quoted in Miami as saying the Porter fired the torpedo at the battleship Iowa, near Gibraltar, during a simulated attack. The Iowa was alerted by radio and changed course in time.

A Navy spokesman said Lewis' account was "substantially correct." He confirmed that the incident occurred as the Iowa was taking President Roosevelt to the Tehran conference with Winston Churchill and Josef Stalin in 1943.

### **Washington, Aug., 21,1970 (AP)**

The massive security measures surrounding a presidential journey today make it seem easy to forget that one chief executive came under torpedo fire - from another U.S. vessel.

But there probably are some Navy men who will never forget a trip the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt took on the battleship Iowa during World War II.

The story is recalled in this month's issue of Naval Institute Proceedings by Cmdr. Charles F. Pick Jr., who was navigator on the Iowa.

### **TO STALIN CONFERENCE**

With the President on the Iowa was the entire Joint Chiefs of Staff, steaming toward North Africa and the Tehran Conference with Josef Stalin.

The Iowa was northeast of Bermuda, Nov. 14, 1943, a good day's run from the nearest known concentration of German U-boats.

The President was in a wheelchair on the left side of the ship watching a gunnery drill with the joint chiefs. Suddenly "Torpedo!" "Torpedo on the starboard beam" roared from the ship's speaker system.

### **YANKED OUT GUN**

"I was petrified, completely immobile," Pick said. "The first sign of life came from the presidential party. One Secret Service man yanked out his pistol, apparently hunting the torpedo. "Roosevelt ordered his valet to wheel him to the right side of the ship, saying "I want to watch the torpedo."

Pick, on the ship's bridge, said a dull explosion shook the ship. An officer next to him yelled, "My God, he's hit us."

He was wrong. The sensitive torpedo warhead had exploded harmlessly below the ship, set off by the turbulence caused when the Iowa took a sharp, evasive turn.

When the Iowa signaled it was beginning the gunnery drill, the destroyers decided to get in a torpedo drill, firing mock torpedoes at the Iowa.

The Porter's torpedo officer had ordered three mock torpedoes but the third one whooshed out of its tube alive, ready to kill.

When everything settled down, Pick recalled, the destroyer was ordered back to its port under arrest.

This was believed the only time an entire ship had been placed under arrest. Pick said, wondering if the legality was ever tested.

Pick remembered the Navy's No. 1 man, Adm. Ernest J. King, standing on the bridge glaring at the Porter.

Nearby, Gen Hap Arnold sidled up to Gen George Marshall and said softly, "George, if you would like to see the sea give up its dead and the skies go black, watch Ernie."

Arnold approached King and asked, "tell me, Ernie, does this happen often in your Navy?"

**13 Nov** - Left Norfolk to escort BB Iowa with President Roosevelt aboard halfway across the Atlantic for conference with Churchill and Stalin, Porter – another can with us accidentally fired a fish at Iowa but missed. No damage. Left Iowa with 3 other cans and returned to Bermuda.<sup>2</sup>

**15 Nov** - Detached from Iowa screening duty, returned to Bermuda on 16 Nov.

**17 Nov** – Headed for Panama Canal Zone. Mistook whale for sub on our way down.<sup>2</sup>

**19 Nov** - Underway for Panama.

**21 Nov** - Sub contact - dropped charges. No results, as the safety was set on all the charges. None went off.

**21 Nov** – arrived Panama Canal. Passed through canal the same night. Pretty dark so couldn't see much. Anchored at Balboa for one day. Liberty but my section had duty. Damn it.<sup>2</sup>

**22 Nov** - In Panama, going through the canal.

**23 Nov** - Tied up in Balboa. Liberty in Panama City.

**23 Nov** – Left Balboa Panama for San Diego. Had Thanksgiving at sea. Very calm and bright. Fell asleep up on bow and got a very severe sunburn.<sup>2</sup>

**24 Nov** - Underway for San Diego.

**01 Dec** - Arrived San Diego.

**01-04 Dec** – Arrived in San Diego for short stay. Managed to get two liberties.<sup>2</sup>

**04 Dec** - Underway for Pearl Harbor.

**04 Dec** – Left San Diego for Pearl Harbor. Quite rough on way across. Some of the boys still get quite sick.<sup>2</sup>

**09 Dec** - Arrived Pearl Harbor.

**09 Dec** – Arrived in Pearl Harbor, from where we operated for approximately one month. Usual escort duty for larger ships, drills and maneuvers. Very disappointed in Honolulu. Not like travel folders at all. Very crummy. Phooey – give me Rome anytime. It will be a real grind from here on it.<sup>2</sup>

**09 Dec** – Bartell<sup>2</sup>

Dear Mom and Dad,

Pozsmark Dec. 9, 1943, San Francisco

Well another day another 25 cents. Today was duty day for me so I had to stay aboard tonight instead of going on liberty. It's just as well cause we need a rest every once in a while to recuperate.

Well how was your Thanksgiving dinner. Ours was swell with turkey with all the trimmings. Do Joe and Eleanor expect to get home for Christmas or have their plans been changed too. It would certainly be nice to have them home. Where will you have Xmas dinner. Home probably.

I am writing this by the light of a flash lite as they have just broken the circuits for repairs. And excuse the paper. I just ran out and can't get anymore until I get ashore again or until the ship's store opens. It's paper anyhow.

I suppose that we will be getting underway again soon. Don't know where to but here's hoping it's action at last. The sooner we get busy the sooner it will be over.

How's the snow anyway. That's one thing I miss a lot. Out here it's warm during the day but gets rather chilly at nite. No snow of course though.

I just squeezed the water out of a burn that I had on my arm. There's one valve here that is behind a hot pipe and although I know the pipe is hot I still manage to burn myself every time I open it.

Well so long for tonite. Tell Les and Bill that I shall write to them soon.

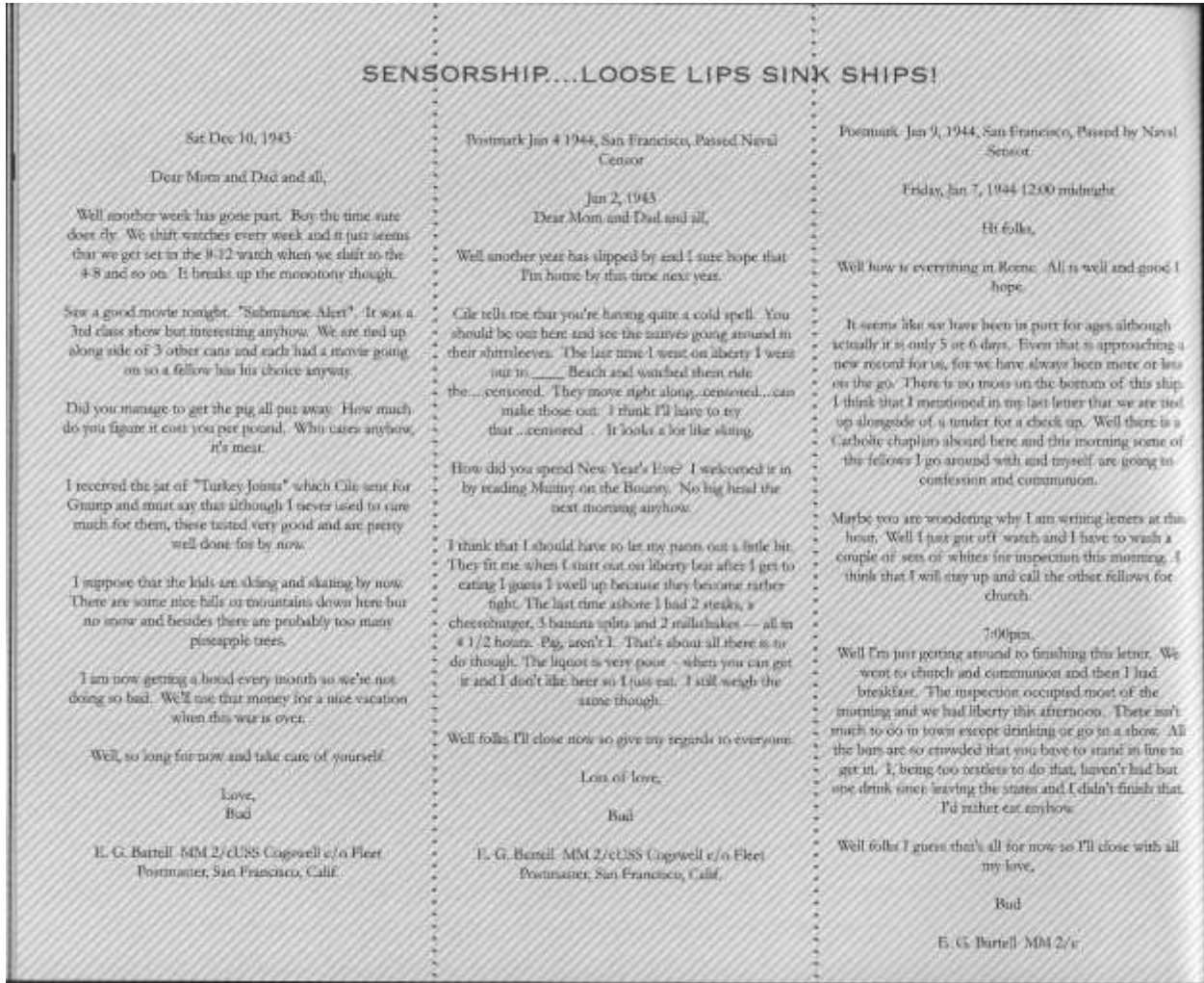

Dec 43-Jan 44 - Bartell<sup>2</sup>



**01 January 1944** - Underway during day and in port at night.

**05-15 Jan** - Out for trial runs, (in port most nights - stopped in Honolulu).

**16 Jan** - Underway with task force (included the Enterprise & Lexington), destination unknown.

**16 Jan** – Left Pearl Harbor for invasion of Marshall Islands. Amphibious forces following closely behind. We crossed Equator Jan 22 and also the date time on the same day. We missed by two degrees of crossing both at the same time. Quite a rugged initiation but a lot of fun. Participated in pre-invasion strikes and shore bombardments. Narrowly missed being hit by return fire from

shore. Cogswell is credited with the sinking of one Jap gunboat. First blood for us. Hit her with only three salvos fired at her.<sup>2</sup>

**21 Jan** - Refueled ship from tanker.

**22 Jan** - Crossed the Equator and the International Date Line.

**25 Jan** - Refueled ship from tanker.

**25-31 Jan** – Patrolled around Marshalls.<sup>2</sup>

**29 Jan** - Refueled ship. Planes from carriers attacked Marshall Island.

**30 Jan** - Bombarded Kwajalein Island from 2500 yards out. Sunk one small ship. Enemy base heavily damaged. A 16" shell from one of our battlewagons hit a munitions barge and all hell broke loose.

**30 Jan-3 Feb** Screened carriers while their planes continued raiding island. Nearest enemy shell landed about 20 yards from our fantail. Picked up three Jap survivors (Knapp) who were found in small boat. Washington rammed the Indiana and lost overboard about eight men, most of them were saved.

**04 Feb** - Pulled into Majuro just two days after it was captured. Still some Japs on the island. Anchored in Majuro Lagoon, Marshall Island.

**05 Feb** – Anchored at Majuro Atoll<sup>2</sup>

**07 Feb** - On night patrol.

**10 Feb** – Bartell<sup>2</sup>

February 10, 1944

Dear Mom and Dad and all,

I hope that this letter finds you all in the best of everything. How's the snow around thataway anyhow. You must have plenty by now.

I'm fine but have had a slight touch of heat rash lately. It goes and comes but it doesn't bother much.

We go swimming every day and have movies in the mess hall also. It's very hot in there especially when you crowd so many guys in but the ship is darkened topside at night so there is no other place to have them.

Cile tells me that Les was disappointed again about not being able to get in the service. Tell him to try one of the merchant marine schools or just the merchant marine. They pay good money and you can pick your ship, stay ashore up to 30 days after each trip, certainly travel enough. Tell him to look into it.

Well this isn't much of a letter but it's about all that I can write about for fear of the long arm of the censor. I'll close now.

**12 Feb** - Underway with task force.

**12 Feb** – Underway for undisclosed destination. Glad to be at sea again. Very hot.<sup>2</sup>

**14 Feb** - Spotted enemy snoopers planes.

**15 Feb** - Planes from our carriers raided Truk Island, Japan's "Pearl Harbor". We did not receive any resistance but planes encounter action over the Island itself.

The New Jersey was sent after six Jap Cruisers. It is believed she sunk two of them. One of our Carriers, the Intrepid was damaged by torpedoes from sub.

**16 Feb** - Steamed towards Majuro Island.

**16 Feb** – Participated in strike against Truk. Lot of AA action the night of Feb 16-17, but no luck for the Cogswell. Now with Task Force 58.<sup>2</sup>

**17 Feb** - Refueled ship and headed west. We were informed that our strike on Truk caused greater damage than was believed at first. Pictures showed that our planes sunk more ships than we knew of.

**18 Feb** - There were about 12 Jap planes in the air, but didn't attack. The Yorktown sent up one night-fighter and they scattered.

**19 Feb** - Still heading west. Enemy planes overhead. One shot down. The others dropped six bombs at one of our carrier off our port beam. Visibility was not very good.

**20 Feb** - Took on fuel from South Dakota (BB).

**21 Feb** - Heading west and expect to attack Saipan Island at dawn. First good nights slept in two weeks.

**22 Feb** - By dawn we shot down about eight or nine enemy planes. The attack let-up for about an hour. Then they returned in groups attacking from all sides. We shot down five more planes. Like a Turkey shoot. Our carrier planes attacked Saipan with little resistance. They destroyed all the planes on the ground and ruined air fields and all the installations that could be found. The Jap planes let up attacking around 11am. Four of the planes shot down were Germans piloted by the Japs. No bomb or torpedo hits were reported by our ships. We stayed at GQ the rest of the day and night. As yet we have not encountered the Jap fleet.

**22 Feb** – Raided the Marlam Islands (Saipan, Guam, and Tinian.) Heavy air opposition during the night. The Cogswell got her first Jap plane, a twin motor bomber.<sup>2</sup>

**23 Feb** - Secured from GQ at 8am. Only got about two hours of sleep in the past 48 hours. We are now heading east. Japs returned, but didn't attack.

**24 Feb** - Took on fuel from the South Dakota.

**25 Feb** - Arrived Majuro Island.

**28 Feb** - Saw the movie "Coney Island with Betty Grable".

**03 Mar** - Started patrol duty five miles off Majuro Island.

**05 Mar** - Went to GQ, about 10 Jap planes approached, but didn't attack.

**07 Mar** - Got underway, heading south. FIRED PRACTICE aa - 20mm & 40mm.

**08 Mar** - Still heading south, crossed Equator.

**08 Mar** – Left Majuro for trip to Espirito Santo in the New Hebrides. Hotter than hell and flies as big as flying fortresses. Arrived there March 8<sup>th</sup>.<sup>2</sup>

**11 Mar** - Put into Espiritu Island - one of the New Hebrides group. Our time went ahead one full day. It is 12 March.

**13 Mar** - Received mail, first since early Jan.

**14 Mar** - Went to GQ, enemy planes spotted, but didn't attack. In the PM saw Ray Milland and his group.

**15 Mar** - Got underway. Heading north.

**15 Mar** – Left Espirito Santo<sup>2</sup>

**19 Mar** - Refueled ship. We are between the Solomon Island and New Britain Island. No enemy contact as yet.

**20 Mar** - Our troops are landing on Masachu(?) Island. We are to intercept any Jap reinforcements that may be coming. Carrier planes went on a bombing mission. Enemy sub in area. Joe Mares spotted periscope, about 5600 yards out.

**20-25 Mar** – Participated in supporting operations during seizure of Emiraw Islands in Admiralty group.<sup>2</sup>

**21 Mar** - Still patrolling outside of Masachu(?) Island.

**22 Mar** - Joined large task force. Refueled ships. It looks like another strike.

**23 Mar** - Heading west.

**26 Mar** - Refueled ships. We are in the middle of many islands held by the Japs.

**29 Mar** - Jap planes attacked, no damage.

**29 Mar** – Participated in strikes on Palau and Yap on March 31. Heavy air opposition during night of March 29. 16 planes shot down. Cogswell suffers near miss. No damage, but scared us a little. Strikes very successful.<sup>2</sup>

**30 Mar** - Our planes attacked Palau Island, one Japan's largest bases outside of Japan. The Japs didn't give us any resistance while we waiting return of our planes. Our planes wrecked all enemy installations and also sunk 10 ships and 20 planes shot down. The rest were wrecked for take off.

Our losses about five planes. Still have not met up with the Jap fleet. A radio message was picked up from a Japanese task force. They are about 500 miles out (most likely going the other way).

**31 Mar** - All night we were attacked by planes. It was not known how many planes were shot down. None of our ships took a hit. Our planes bombed Yap Island. The Japs took off, leaving a few planes, which were destroyed, along with base installations. In the afternoon our planes bombed Waju(?) Island. Again the Japs took off. Sunk two of their patrol boats. We picked up quite a few men on rafts. Some were Japs and some were our own fliers. The Japanese broadcast, claimed they sunk two of our cruisers, two destroyers, one carrier and shot down over 80 planes from our task force which attacked Palau, Yap and Wajau(?) Islands.

**01 Apr** - We are heading east. Sighted two Jap sub tenders and they were sunk by one of our destroyers. We crossed the Equator and 180th Meridian at least twice on this trip.

01 Apr – Bartell<sup>2</sup>

April 1, 1944

Dear Mom and Dad and all,

Just a line to let you know that I received your letter of March 10 and was glad to hear from you. I am fine and fit and expect to be that way for a long time. I am sorry that I can't tell you where I am or have been or am going to be but maybe it's best that way. I never was much of a talker and if I can't tell you now it will give me a lot to gab about when I come home. So Les is in the Navy now. Does he say what he is going to try to take up. I think that he will get a kick out of whatever he does decide to do. By the way what does the S.A.W. in Joe's address mean anyhow. I'm sorry in a way to see him shipped out but in a way it will do him some good just as it has done for me - namely make us appreciate home a hell of a lot more. I'm glad to hear that you, Mom, have taken up bowling - it's good for one's girlish figure. Ask Dad. How are your scores? I guess that one of these days we will be putting into a base where we can get some liberty and a drink. Boy even a beer would taste good right now and I never did like the stuff. If I had a couple of cases of Old Overholt out here I could retire for life. That's all for now.

**02 Apr** - Refueled from carrier. The second night we left our task force to hunt for a man who fell overboard from a carrier. The search was unsuccessful. It was very dark with visibility at 500 yds.

**03 Apr** - Heading east. There is a large Japanese wolf pack (subs) lying in wait for us off Junape(?) Island. Two of them were spotted and sunk.

**06 Apr** - Outside Majuro Island, plane crashed on carrier. Anchored in Majuro Lagoon. The crew as a whole are very weary and could use a good night's sleep.

**06 Apr** – Back in Majuro for minor repairs.<sup>2</sup>

**07 Apr** - Pulled out for patrol duty in afternoon.

**08 Apr** - Made sub contact. Dropped depth charges. No results.

**10-11 - Apr** Anchored in Majuro Lagoon. Loaded stores and ammunition.

**13 Apr** - The weather is and has been very hot and humid. Received mail. Went to sea this afternoon. The rumor is that this is going to be a long hard trip, as we expect to run into the Japanese fleet.

**13 Apr** – Left Majuro to lay groundwork for invasion of Hollandia<sup>2</sup>

**14 Apr** - Heading west. Last night spotted Jap sub, most likely the one we missed the other night. This means they know we are out there and they are waiting. It is getting hotter and hotter, it is still the rainy season.

**16 Apr** - We go ahead one full day. Last night a carrier lost a man overboard.

**17 Apr** - It was disclosed to us that our destination is off the N.W. coast of New Guinea. Our first strike is to take place on the 21st. Hollandia Islands is one of our main objectives. As far as we know, this island and all the smaller islands are well fortified and we will no doubt be attacked night and day by Jap "Betty's" it and such. Already our tanker unit has been spotted by a Jap search plane.

**18 Apr** - Another man was lost over the side of one of our ships. Two destroyers were sent out to search for him, it was in vain. We passed over the Equator again at 6:14:45 last evening.

**19 Apr** One "Betty" shot down by C.A.P plane.

**20 Apr** - Fueled ship from South Dakota. Went to GQ at 100. One of the cruisers thought they saw a periscope. It turned out to be a swab handle. As yet there have been no bogies reported. One of our C.A.P. planes shot down another "Betty".

**21 Apr** - Our carriers launched planes for air attack on Aitape, Hollandia and Tanamera bases meeting very little resistance. We are not even manning our battle stations. Our squadron is screening carriers. Hollandia is a large sub base, therefore there are many subs around us. As yet they have not made themselves known, but it is believed that they will start attacking some of our ships shortly.

**22 Apr** - Steaming in circles as before, Aitape, Hollandia, and Tanamera are being raided constantly. Early this morning our troops started to invade these island bases. As yet there has not been any information given out as to the results of yesterday's raids. It was made known to us today that the British have started a great air offensive against Sumatra in the Dutch East Indies. General Douglas MacArthur watched the attack from one of our cruisers. Admiral Nimitz is also out here someplace.

**22 Apr** – Participated in supporting operations during seizure of Aitape, Hollandia, and Tanamera.<sup>2</sup>

**23 Apr** - Fueled ship from Massachusetts (BB). Came very close to the shore of New Guinea. As yet no contacts with subs or aircraft. Still no news on the invasion.

**24 Apr** - Steaming as before. This morning one of our C.A.P. planes shot down a Jap "Betty" or a fighter just a few miles from us. We saw it explode and burn for about 20 minutes. Expect to be attacked tonight by Jap planes. Out of the 20,000 troops that invaded New Guinea only one man was killed and he fell off a L.C.T. on the way in and drowned. They have about 140,000 Jap troops surrounded.

**25 Apr** - Last night we went to GQ at about 1730 until 2300. There were about 20 planes out hunting for us, couldn't find us. One of our night fighters shot down "Betty". Another fighter was on the tail of another Jap for about 40 miles, but couldn't fire as his guns jammed. This morning we fueled from tanker. We expect another attack tonight. The latest scuttlebutt is that we are going to put into one of the Admiralty Islands. It is hot as hell!

**26 Apr** - Still patrolling outside of New Guinea. One Jap "Betty" was shot down on the horizon. The Caperton took the Chief of Staff from the Lexington into New Guinea and returned that night. We went to GQ, but didn't get to fire as one of our fighters shot down the plane. We transferred three officers from the Enterprise to a tanker. Evidently they are going back to the states. Received mail from the South Dakota.

**27 Apr** -The Knapp was detailed to pick 6 Jap airmen. Went to battle station. Two more Jap "Bettys" shot down by our planes. Last night was quiet.

**28 Apr** - Twelve Jap torpedo planes attacked one of our destroyers but didn't do any damage. Since we have left Majuro we have traveled over 4300 miles. Found out we are going to hit Truk Island again. All but one of the Marshall Islands have been captured and they are within shore battery range of the island itself.

**29 Apr** - Went to GQ early this morning. Our carrier planes started raiding Truk Island. Jap "zeros" attacked one of our other Task Groups. Three were shot down. They did not inflict any damage on our ships. No planes bothered us for some reason, until late morning. Five of them attacked our group. Two shot down. Our ships didn't suffer any damages. Frank Knox, Secretary of Navy died from heart attack.

**29 Apr** - (Again) We went back one day. Enemy sub sank by one of our destroyers in other task group. They picked up old books, Jap candy, and a wallet from sub. No bodies. The Japs have lost 80 planes in all at Truk, 40 on ground and 40 in the air. Our losses at Truk were four fighters and pilots. Also a T.B.T. and a Coronado. The crews on these last two were saved. A plane made a crash landing, pilot saved. Boggies day and night.

**29 Apr** - Participated on series against Satawan, Panape, and Truk. More air opposition. Task Force 58 really beginning to make itself felt now.<sup>2</sup>

**30 Apr** - Today our cruisers went in and bombarded Truk Island. One enemy plane came in high and unloaded his bombs on us, but missed. He got away. Our task group also hit Sawatan today.

**01 May** - On our way back to Majuro Lagoon. The battlewagons left us and went to bombard Ponapa Island.

**01 May** – Polished off previous operation by bombarding Panape.<sup>2</sup>


**02 May** - Refueled from South Carolina. A seam is splitting open in one of our fuel tanks and we need to go into dry docks.

**04 May** – Back in Majuro. Went into dry dock for repairs. Fell from staging, landed on head – result three stitches and one scar.<sup>2</sup>

**05 May** - Arrived Majuro Lagoon on 4 of May. Today at noon we entered dry dock. All hands turned to and scrapped bottom. One stag broke and five men fell to bottom of dry dock. Three were taken to the hospital ship, USS Relief.

**06 May** - Tied up beside USS Markab, DD tender.

**09 May** – Bartell<sup>2</sup>



May 9, 1944  
Dear Mom and Dad and Bill,  
I received Dad's letter of April 13th today and am glad to hear that everything is going okay both at home and at the B&K. I told Cile in my letter tonight to be sure to give Joe his share of the dividend. She would anyhow but I just had to stick my nose into it someplace.

I suppose that Les has been sent to some school by this time. I'm waiting to hear just where he will settle for a while so that I can write to him. Also now that Joe has stopped moving around I shall have to write to him. How's Eleanor making out - does she need any help? If so please let me know will you?

I got over onto the beach here today with a recreation party and had a couple of bottles of beer. Vile stuff but it's all we can get. I guess from what I read in the news that it's hard to get liquor back there also. It rained cats and pups but we just sat there singing and drinking. We finally wandered off in the mud and ended up at the airstrip looking over all the different planes - fighter, dive bomber, torpedo and etc. Also looked over some of the buildings the japs (don't rate a capital) build but everything's been picked clean of souvenirs. Anyhow it felt good to walk on land again even in the mud and rain.

Yes I guess that things are looking better out here - all over in fact but you people know as much about that as I do. The only news we get is scuttlebutt and a newspress consisting of news received over short wave from the states. The only time we know for certain is where we see it ourselves which has happened a few times.

Well I'll close now with all my love and give my regards to all.

**11 May-01 Jun** - We have been in and out of port working with carriers training new plane crews.

**12 May – 06 June** – Operated in and out of Majuro on routine patrol duty. Still very hot.<sup>2</sup>

**02-04 Jun** - About 20 of our men have been transferred back to the states.

**06 Jun** - Got underway. This is supposed to be our biggest operation.

**06 June** – Left Majuro for Marianas<sup>2</sup>

**07 Jun** - It was disclosed to us that the pilot we fished out of the ocean a few months ago was killed in our last raid on Truk. He was captain of Darmount's football team just a few years ago. We were told that on 05 June when we went to GQ it was because of Jap planes that got in over the lagoon. They were not detected until after they were inside. It was believed they took pictures. It is believed they have discovered our identification signal, (IFF).

**07 Jun** - Our allied forces invaded Europe today.

**09 Jun** - Still steaming west. Refueled from the Alabama (BB). The sea is rough, had a near collision with her. It has been 6 months and 4 days since we left the US.

**10 Jun** - Our destination is Saipan and surrounding islands. The Jap Fleet is expected to make an appearance this time. For the past two days our planes have had a running battle with a small Jap Naval unit off the NW coast of New Guinea. So far four of their destroyers were sunk and one cruiser damaged. Today we were warned that this is the biggest operation thus far conducted out here and it is expected that we will encounter much resistance from Jap planes and fighting ships. This morning one of our planes shot down a "Betty". As yet we have not been spotted, we hope.

**11 Jun** - Heading towards Saipan, Tinian and Guam. Refueled from Lexington. The first fighter sweep over Saipan took off this afternoon.

**11 Jun** - Participated in supporting operations during seizure of Saipan. We were under continuous air attack, though it was not very effective.<sup>2</sup>

**12 Jun** - We are cruising around 160 miles from the coast of Saipan. Tokyo is about 1400 miles off and Philippine Islands are about 1000 miles. Went to GQ about 7pm last night. They thought that some Jap planes were coming out to engage us, but they proved to be ours that got lost and found their way back. Secured from GQ at 8pm. Went to GQ at 4am this morning. About 30 to 40 Jap planes were overhead. They dropped flares, no bombs. Visibility was very poor, that must be the reason they didn't attack. One Jap tried to make a torpedo run on a destroyer and was shot down.

Our planes shot 124 Jap planes over Saipan yesterday and we lost eleven Planes. Most of the pilots were picked by our rescue planes. There is no evidence of the Jap fleet. Only a few ship in Saipan that became the target. Today is D-3. The invasion will take place the 15th. It is believed that Saipan is well fortified. They have about 20,000 troops on her. Just found out that we have been assigned a special mission. We picked up an officer and some guard mail from the Lexington and are now proceeding back to Eniwetok by ourselves at a speed of twenty-five knots. Here's hoping we don't run into too many Japs. Anything over ten would be too much. It is imperative that we get to Eniwetok by the 14th.

**14 Jun** - Still steaming. The force we were with went and bombed Saipan last night. No results as yet. We discovered that some of our 5" projectiles don't work. Arrived Eniwetok this afternoon. We will most likely stay long enough to refuel. The invasion is tomorrow. Got underway a few hours after refueling.

**15 Jun** - Steaming back to join our group. We missed out on the bombardment of Saipan, but they said our mission was still important. In fact, it was the most important part of the whole damn works.

**16 Jun** - Today we rejoined our group off Guam. We found out that they were attacked last night by a new Jap torpedo plane call "Fran". A couple of destroyers and a BB were hit. There were three killed and 48 wounded. We delivered mail to the Lexington, BB and DDs. Refueled from a tanker, "Celestie".

**17 Jun** - Still patrolling around Saipan, Tinian, and Guam. Our invasion forces are being met with heavy resistance but are advancing slowly. We were informed that the Japanese Fleet has left port and is heading this way. A big sea battle is expected.

It is believed that as things stand now we are outnumbered but if we can get the rest of our group together everything will be all right. Tonight we expect to be raided by land-based planes and will go to GQ after dark.

**18 Jun** - We are 200 miles west of Saipan. There are large Jap task forces to the North and South of us. Also one a few hundred miles behind our group watching us. Although we have been waiting for their fleet to come out, now that they have we can't go get them as we have to protect our invasion forces on Saipan. It is believed that we will take part in the biggest sea battle in history very shortly. There are Jap subs all around us. Last night and the night before, there were a few short engagements with subs and sampans. The Bronson and Cotton each sunk a sampan and the other destroyers don't know if they got subs or not as it was too dark to see too much. A few of the other groups shot down three Japs. They didn't do any damage to our ships.

**19 Jun** - The biggest air battles since Midway took place today. About 400 Jap planes from Jap Carriers attacked us of which 309 were shot down. A few bombs dropped pretty close to us but didn't do any damage. In fact, none of our group was hit. The South Dakota (BB) suffered minor damage. Our losses were very low. Stayed at GQ all day. We don't know the exact location of the Jap fleet, but believe they are not more than 300 miles away.

**19 June** – Japs try to catch us with our bloomers down but are intercepted by our planes at a distance of 136 miles. Only 18 planes managed to break through. All of these were shot down. Total for the day was 353. Japs still haven't laid a hand on T.F. 58.<sup>2</sup>

**20 Jun** - Today the Jap fleet was located and a big air strike was launched. Our planes returned from strike about 2130 and were very low on fuel. Planes were dropping all around us for lack of fuel. We came about three feet from being rammed by another destroyer today. We rescued five pilots from the drink. They told us that some of our planes ran out of fuel as far back as 240 miles. The sky was lit up like the fourth of July. It was a spectacle that I will never forget. Com. Kane, ace pilot, from the Enterprise is still missing. Searching parties composed of destroyers will be out hunting for survivors for the next 24 hours.

20 Jun – We launch air attack against the beaten and fleeing Jap Fleet. Our Flyers managed to make contact but many, many planes land in the sea upon return due to great distance covered and shortage of fuel. We spent most of the night retrieving our flyers. The Cogswell almost rammed by the Ingersoll. Our flyers (still T.F. 58) sunk one carrier, one destroyer, and three tankers. And damaged one battleship, one cruiser, and two cans.<sup>2</sup>

**21 Jun** - Had a helluva night last night. One Jap plane followed one of our T.B.F. in and crashed. It was not until after they had picked up the pilots and gave them clean clothes did they find out they were Japs, Ask me (John Huber) the story and I'll tell you. I believe most of the pilots that crashed have been pickup. Our position is about half way between Saipan and the China coast. We are still chasing the Jap Fleet. Our planes sunk one carrier, damaged four more, sunk one



destroyer, damaged a battlewagon and two cruisers. It is believed that some of their force has found a safe passage as we cannot locate the whole force. I heard a Japanese broadcast yesterday. They promised their people a huge victory for their forces. They said they already shot down over 300 of our carrier planes, sunk two CV's, two BB's, one cruiser, one destroyer and one sub. And damaged 4 CV's, 2 BB's, 2 CL's and about four or five DD's. (That is some line). They are on a course of 310 and going like hell. We refueled from the Big "E" and returned her pilots. We were literally showered with candy and gum.

**22 Jun** - We are heading back to Saipan. Our forces are doing very good there.

**23-28 Jun** - Not much happening. No sign of Jap Fleet. We chased them within 900 miles of Tokyo. The other day we transferred Adm. McCain from the big "E" to the Lexington. We are delivering mail passengers from ship to another.

**28 Jun-02 Jul** - Still around Saipan, Guam and Rota. Our forces on Saipan took heavy losses. The Island is 12 miles long and had gained 6 miles of it with casualties about 10,000. Every night there has been a few Japs shot down. One came close to our ship when he crashed. Refueled from tanker.

30 Jun – Complete previous operation and anchored just off Saipan. Watched other cans and dive bombers and mortars from Saipan proceed to shell and bomb. Tinian across the bay, it was very spectacular. Also noted at the same time one Cogswell sailor fishing from the fantail. No luck.<sup>2</sup>

**04 Jul** - Refueled ship. DDs Cogswell, Knapp, Caperton, Ingersoll have been designated to go in around Guam and Rota and attack shipping and heckle shore batteries.

04 Jul – Left Saipan to bombard Guam. Had slight internal casualty and made bombardment runs on one screw at 18 knots. Completed repairs and continued on mission. Continued to patrol around these islands.<sup>2</sup>

**05 Jul** - Went within five miles of Guam and bombarded four towns and military installations. Some Jap planes came out but didn't do any damage. We also watched our planes making bombing runs. We will rejoin our Task Group 58.3 tomorrow.

**07 Jul** - Rejoined Task Group 58.3. Steaming east towards Eniwetok Island.

**10 Jul** - Arrived Eniwetok after being at sea for 34 days.

**11-15 Jul** - Received mail and took on supplies.

**17 Jul** - Left Eniwetok 2 1/2 days ago. We are about 100 miles off Guam. We are expecting to bombard again and attack shipping. Our planes are attacking Guam.

**20 Jul** - Returned to Saipan. Our division and 3 BB's are anchored off Saipan and Tinian about 5000 yards. Planes bombing and destroyers bombarding Tinian. Saipan has been captured about five days ago. It was a bloody battle, 15,000 casualties for us and many for the Japs. There are about 2,000 Japs left on Saipan, they are hiding in caves. A lot have committed Hari-kari, and

some tried to escape by small boat. The natives were with the Japs instead of against them like we thought.

**21 Jul** - Left Saipan last night and rejoined TG 58.3. Today is D-Day on Guam. So far two planes have crashed in our group. One while landing on carrier and bounced off into the water. The only one we recovered was the belly gunner (TBF). The pilot and the radioman went down with plane. The other plane crashed and blew up after it took off from the carrier. We searched and only found one shoe with some flesh in it.

**23 Jul** - Steaming southwest towards Palau and Yap.

**24 Jul** - We are now right in the middle of numerous Jap bases, including Palau, Yap, Wake, Truk and many others. They have not attacked us, yet. However the DD Scott was hit with an 8" shell the other day - all bridge personnel including the Captain were killed.

**25 Jul** - Our carrier planes made attacks on Palau yesterday and today. There was not much air opposition but plenty of ack-ack. Also a few ships were in the harbor. One was believed to be a carrier. Most of the ships were hit and set on fire. Practically all pilots that were shot down were rescued by some our destroyers. We picked up a fighter pilot from the drink. His plane fell into the ocean after he took off.

25 Jul – 27 Jul – Participated in strike against Palau. Our planes destroyed 2 planes in air, 8 planes on ground, 1 destroyer, 1 troop-transport, 1 small craft, and left 1 cruiser burning.<sup>2</sup>

**31 Jul** - Pulled out of Saipan.

**01-03 Aug** - Steamed around outside of Saipan and Tinian. Refueled ship last night from tanker. Have been in a storm for about 3 days.

**04 Aug** - Our carrier planes attacked Chicchi-Shima, one of the Bonin Island group about 600 miles from Japan. They also attacked a Jap convoy composed of 4 transports (AK), 4 destroyers, and 1 cruiser. They hit three of the AK's and one destroyer and strafed the rest. The Knapp, Ingersoll and Cogswell were sent after the other ones that were getting away. We steamed at 30 knots for six hours to catch up with the convoy. We had to pass right off the coast of many Jap Islands and through a mine field. We caught up with Japs around sunset. We were sent after two of the ships along with the Knapp and Ingersoll, which were about 10 miles away. It took us about 45 minutes to catch them as they were steaming away at 20-25 knots. It was dark when we finally opened fire on them. The battle lasted a little over an hour. We blasted the hell out of what turned out to be the cruiser and helped blast the other target which was either a destroyer or transport. When we left the cruiser was on its side and the other ship sinking nose first. A few of the cruiser's shots landed pretty close, but no damage was done. After rejoining our cruisers we found out that they had caught up with the rest of the Japs and blasted them. At about 1 O'clock this morning we were 300 miles off the coast of Japan and 382 miles from Tokyo. This is the closest any US surface vessel has come to Japan since the start of the war. Very, very ticklish! Two days ago the Caperton, DD650 sunk a 10,000 ton AK transport. The Sec. of Navy sent his congratulations to the 5th Fleet of which we are part of for the fine work. We are also part of Task Force 58 - We are

Task Group 58.3. Still cruising around Tinian, Guam and Rota. Last night there was a dog fight over our ship. Our fighter shot down the Jap and he fell close to our fantail.

04 Aug – Participated in strike against Iwo Jima Island in the Bonin group. Received word during night of a convoy partly crippled by our flyers. Three light cruisers and four cans of which we were one detached to pursue and destroy. We chased Japs for over 6 hours at 34 knots, finally made contact just after dusk off the coast of Chichi Jima Island. The entire enemy convoy was destroyed in the following battle. This convoy consisted of 5 supply ships, 4 D.E.'s, 1 DD, 1 CL, and also a number of landing barges loaded with troops. The Cogswell being division leader was number one can in the pursuit. We are credited with the sinking of the light cruiser and also an assist on the destroyer and one supply ship. We found the supply ship burning when we arrived and pumped 4 salvos at 30 knots into her. She rolled over and went down. We must have knocked out the CL's radar and fire control because her return fire was very inaccurate.<sup>2</sup>

**05 Aug** - Early this morning we were attacked by several Jap torpedo planes. Although we didn't shoot any down, like wise they didn't score. Our small group is heading for Chichi-Shima to bombard. This morning the cruisers bombard as we steamed around. We passed two Japs hanging onto a life raft, playing dead. The Knapp picked up six out approximately 75 Japs, that were in the water. It was believed they were from one the transports that was hit. We fired our 40mm at a small Jap landing craft. After knocking out a good percentage of the Jap gun placements on Chichi-Shima we are heading back to our Task Group.

**06 Aug** - Left the carriers and joined up with the BBs and cruisers. Still steaming east.

06 Aug – Participated in DesDiv 100's bombardment of Chichi Jima. We destroyed their radio installations, 4 oil dumps, 3 cargo ships in harbor and several landing barges, 58 planes on the ground, silenced their shore batteries and put the finishing touch on the Island by leveling off the city. This and the above action [4 Aug] is the closest that any ships have been to Japan in this war. 30 miles. Very, very soul-satisfying.<sup>2</sup>

**10 Aug** - Put into Eniwetok. Taking on supplies and a much needed rest.

11 Aug – Bartell<sup>2</sup>

Dear Mom and Dad and all,

August 11, 1944

Well back in port again and it feels pretty good to be at anchor again. I got 3 letters from you folks today and one from Lester. I guess his was the first one he wrote to me when he arrived in Gulfport because I've gotten a later letter from him.

What do you think of Cile buying the house. I think that it's the cats whiskers myself and I'm anxiously awaiting a description and some pictures of it. It's located right about where I'd like it.

I'm glad to hear that Dad is playing a series of concerts and I'll bet the band sounds real good. We don't hear much music out here - only a few records that we have on board and once in a while we hear Tokio Rose. She has a real good program with good music and all the latest news from a japs point of view.

Oh well such is life. I should have been a \_\_\_\_\_. I sure hope that Les gets to go to I.C. school. That's 32 week in Washington and a real good school. That's the desire of all the (spark plugs) on there anyhow. I think that I shall now put in a request for refrigeration and air conditioning. That is located at the Carrier Corp in Syracuse but only lasts 4 weeks. There's not much chance though because there's only a few applications sent out here to the fleet and its just like finding a needle in a haystack. Its fun to dream anyhow.

How's everything at the shop. Still humming right along.

I am sorry to hear about Virginia and I hope that she's not too badly scarred. Mine seems to be getting smaller and a little more faint or maybe I'm just getting used to it.

Well folks I guess I'll close now so take it easy and give my regards to all.

**16 Aug** - Caperton presented a little radio broadcast for our benefit. It was very well written and quite humorous. It is the eve of our first anniversary.

**17 Aug** - A big beach party held today.

17 Aug – Cogswell has first anniversary party. I had duty. Very hot after the cool weather around Bonins.<sup>2</sup>

**20 Aug** - Very few transfers have come in this time. Ammunition barge almost blew up on our fantail 500 rounds of ammo in it. CGM Thompson picked up faulty projectile and tossed it overboard. Everyone else that was standing around dove overboard.

Dear Folks,

I just received your letter of Aug 6 and was glad to hear from you. I'm glad that you enjoyed your trip to Canada. That is a tough break about Jackie isn't it. I hope that it is not too serious. He sure deserves a leave home if anybody does. I just finished a letter to him, V-mail, and hope that he gets it okay. Have you heard from Joe lately or is he still on the move. It's too bad I didn't get a chance to talk to the Eddy boy the other day. He would have liked to hear about Joe. I guess we'll be on the move again before this week is out so you can expect to have another long wait after this letter or the next. It's quite a bit cooler out to sea so that's a good point anyhow. We saw a couple of good movies tonight and surprise it didn't rain one drop during the whole thing. Usually if we are anchored alone we have one show and there is a delay between each reel for changing. When we are tied up to another can we have two shows and they work it pretty slick so that there is a continuous show. Almost like the Capitol only more fresh air and no bank \_\_\_\_(?)

Well folks don't worry and take care of yourselves.

**28 Aug** - Left port. steaming southwest.

**30 Aug** – Left Eniwetok for raid on Palau.<sup>2</sup>

**03 Sep** - They expect heavy air resistance from Palau Island. We are designated to go in and bombard.

**07 Sep** - On the 6th Launched first air strike on Palau. Our division and 3 cruisers went to bombard city. It turned out to be a coordinated air and sea strike.

**07 Sep** – Bombarded Palau.<sup>2</sup>

**09 Sep** - Started out for Mindanao in the Philippines.

**10 Sep** - Launched first air strike on Mindanao. This the first air strike on the Philippines. Our loss were light. Enemy losses heavy. Many ships sunk and damaged in the harbor.

**9-10 Sep** – Escorted carriers on first strikes against Mindanao Islands in the Philippines.<sup>2</sup>

**12-13 Sep** – Participated in strikes against Jap help Visayans in Philippines.<sup>2</sup>

**13 Sep** - Still in the Philippines area. We found out that the Filipinos are using guerrilla tactics against the Japs. They have bases up in the hills and the Japs won't go after them. Our subs make frequent visits to them behind the backs of the Japs. Four of our pilots have been rescued by them.

**14 Sep** - Steaming back to Palau. A Jap bomber snuck in on us this morning but didn't do any damage, he got away.

**15 Sep** - Hanging around the island as they expect the Japs to reinforce their troops.

**16 Sep** - Off on another strike.

**17-18 Sep** – Supported the invasion of southern islands of the Palau group.<sup>2</sup>

**19 Sep** - We're off Luzon. Our carrier planes have struck Manila for the first time in the war. Many AK and AOs were sunk. A few Jap planes snuck in on us but didn't do any damage. We were bombed by one plane and showered by shrapnel from one of our own gun fire. No casualties. Our planes are receiving stiff resistance over Manila.

**21 Sep** - Planes pounding harbor installations. A typhoon is coming up and we are going to have to make a run for it.

**21-22 Sep** – Participated in strikes against Manila Bay area Philippines.<sup>2</sup>

**22 Sep** - We ducked around the typhoon. Refueled and heading back to the Philippines for another strike. To date the count is:

**24 Sep** – Participated in strikes against Visayans for the second time. Our aircraft seem to be getting all the gravy during the last few strikes.<sup>2</sup>

**25 Sep** - We are steaming down to get between Mindanao in the Philippines and Palau in an attempt to break up a Jap air attack on the Palau group. On the 26th didn't see any Japs.

**27 Sep** - Pulled in the coastal passage in the Palau Island and anchored.

**28 Sep – 07 Oct** – Ran in and out of Uthili in Caroline Group trying to dodge bad weather. Very, very rough. We took a 47 degree roll at one time.<sup>2</sup>

**29 Sep** - Went on patrol last night, anchored in the morning. Nothing new - Hot as hell -No Mail - No supplies (we are low).

**02 Oct** - The last few days we had the same routine. Now we are on our way to about 145 miles from Yap - Ulithi. We are not searching Japs, but are now in quest of food. Don't know where our supply ships are.

Note: For the past month and the half we have been attached to Adm. Halsey's Third Fleet. We were relieved from Task Force 58 after our strike at the Bonin's. The situation in China is acute. We still feel the war will be over by Jan 1946.

**03 Oct** - Arrived Ulithi. Not much here.

**04-07 Oct** -We were chased out of Ulithi by a typhoon. Rolled and tossed for three days.

**09 Oct** - This entry is being added per information supplied by R. Dale Martin former RM2 aboard the USS Flying Fish, SS229. Mr. Martin states, He was in charge of the Radio Gang on the USS Flying Fish on October 9, 1944, when the USS Cogswell depth charged her. The first two charges did do enough damage to cause the conning tower to be abandoned except for himself. He had to man the sonar and try contacting the USS Cogswell. The following was taken from notes on the radio shack's calendar, 9 Oct 1944, 70th day on patrol, received 5 depth charges from a friendly Tin Can, DAMN HIM!, 35 degree down angle going all ahead standard. Finally a recognition signal was received. The following message was transmitted:

9 October 1944

1535 Destroyer challenged us on sound - FOJ

We sent reply - LAW (This was repeated several times)

He then sent the following - BT are you damaged? K

We replied - NO K (He really said: No, but our feelings are God Damned Hurt.)

(The Flying Fish's Commander was Robert D. Risser, USN)

He then rogered

After about ten minutes he sent the following - AA V D651 K

We replied D651 V S229 K

S229 V D651 BT are you O.K.? K

D651 V S229 BT Yes we are OK. can we surface K

S229 V D651 R R

S229 V D651 BT Roger smoke bomb -surface K

D651 V S229 IMI K

S229 V D651 Send smoke bomb

D651 V S229 Roger

S229 V D651 Roger surface K

D651 V S229 R R

Secured and surfaced at 0740 GCT

The Conning Tower damage earned the Flying Fish a trip to the states and six months in San Francisco.

The above incident was not unique during the war. In fact, of the 52 US Submarines which were lost, (by all causes) two, the Seawolf and Dorado, were sunk by "friendly" forces. The Seawolf by Destroyers and the Dorado by Aircraft.

In the spring of 1945, the Flying Fish was coming into Point Loma after a training exercise, and passed the Cogswell heading out to sea. The Flying Fish's CO asked the CO of the Cogswell, How many charges were dropped, and response was "11". 5 or 11, in any event, the Flying Fish was not sunk. Mr. Martin attended the Cogswell's October 1990 reunion and apologies were exchanged. An invitation was extended to the Cogswell to attend the Submariner's Reunion.

**10 Oct** - We have obtained some provisions.

10 Oct – Escorted carriers for series of air strikes against Ikinawa in Namsel Shoto [sp]. Very little opposition. <sup>2</sup>

**11 Oct** - We are on the move again.

**12 Oct** - Participated in strikes against Formosa. Task force was under very heavy assault by Jap Air Force. The cruisers Houston and Canberra were torpedoed, during the night 96 miles from coast of Formosa. The Cogswell was one of four ships picked to escort these cripples to safety. <sup>2</sup>

**13 Oct** - We were attacked by Jap planes. No damage to any ships. We shot down many planes.

**14-17 Oct** - The Japs sent wave after wave of planes after these two helpless ships. We were left with little or no air support as we were later to find out, we were bait for trap to entice the Jap Fleet out. The Houston took another fish during one of these attacks, but she managed to stay afloat. The Cogswell is credited with one Jap plane. We turned the cripples over to a force of tankers one day out of Ulithi. Sure seems good to once again speed up to 25 knots after doing only 4 knots for the last few days. <sup>2</sup>

**15 Oct** - On our way to Formosa.

**16 Oct** - Our planes are attacking Formosa. We have been attacked by Jap planes. This evening one of our cruisers was hit by torpedo and is listing pretty bad. We have designated to escort her out of the danger zone.

**17 Oct** - Another cruiser was hit last night and we are escorting her. In our group there are 4 cruisers and seven destroyers.

**18-22 Oct** - We are making good about four knots and are only about 200 miles from Formosa. The past four days and nights we have been attacked by Jap planes. A group of Jap torpedo bombers started in on us, but were intercepted by planes from our carriers. A few got in but didn't get out. One of the damaged cruisers was hit again. She has taken three fish so far and is still floating. We were informed, that on the 21st MacArthur invaded Leyte Island in Philippines.

**19-24 Oct** - October 19th -24th - Covered invasion of Central Philippines. Rumors had it that the Jap fleet was on the way out. <sup>2</sup>



**24 Oct** - Still being attacked by the Jap planes. We are very tired and the worst is still to come. Our battleships, carriers, cruisers and others are very close to us.

**25 Oct** - Early this morning we were detached from the cripples and are now in the battle line which consists of 5 BBs - 11 cruisers and 14 destroyers. We are on our way to meet the Japs. We think the Japs have tricked us. Some of the bigger units are down around Leyte. There is a big battle going on down there. So far our planes have sunk 3 out of 4 carriers in the group we're going after and 1 BB and 2 cruisers. They left one crippled carrier which we expect to get, 2 BBs and some destroyers and cruisers.

**24-25 Oct** - Participated in battle with main Jap Fleet. Destroyer Division 100, six other destroyers and four cruisers were detached from our main force to mop up. Jap Fleet units reported damage by our aircraft. We caught up with a carrier lying dead in the water and our cruisers proceeded to sink it. Two of our cans left behind to deal with survivors. Later in the night we caught up with a light cruiser. It had reported crippled but when we closed to make torpedo runs, she speeded up to 24 knots. We were surprised!!! Our cruisers and cans then drew off to shell the Jap. We made another torpedo run and out of five fish scored one hit. One Jap destroyer was also sunk by our force. <sup>2</sup>

**27 Oct** - Heavy damage was inflicted on the entire Jap Fleet down around Leyte and up north quite a few of our destroyer were sunk and damaged. We also lost two carriers. (The Princeton and a CVE down south). Although a few planes made a torpedo run on us, none succeeded in hitting us. Our ship had three probable planes and one sure shot down.

**30 Oct** - Back in Ulithi. Received mail and provisions.

**31 Oct** - On our way to Manes in the Admiralty Island.

**01 Nov** - Some more of the Jap fleet is on the move again. We have turned around and are going after them.

**01 Nov** - Left Ulithi once again to give further support to the invasion of the Philippines. <sup>2</sup>

**03 Nov** - Reno, a light cruiser, was torpedoed by sub. The sub got away. Cogswell and two other cans picked to escort her back to Ulithi. The weather was very bad and Reno is very bad condition. <sup>2</sup>

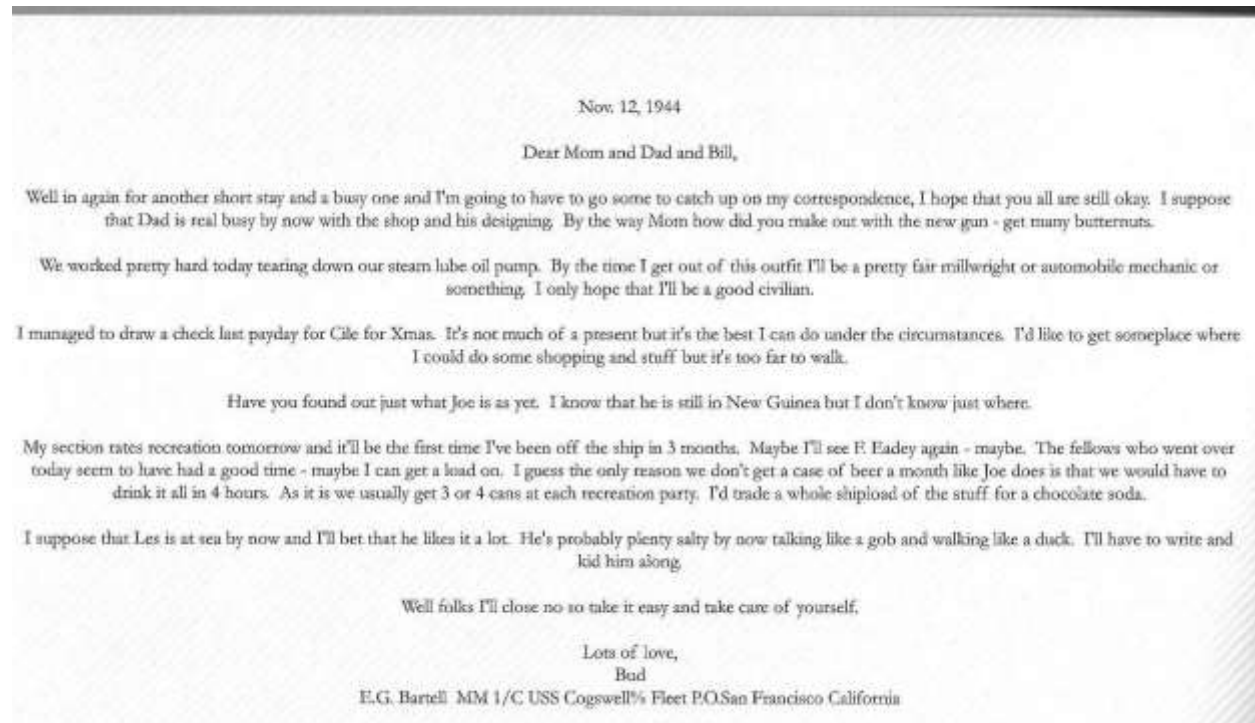
**04 Nov** - The Reno was torpedoed last night by a sub. She was right behind us. The explosion woke everyone up. We picked up a CMM which was blown overboard. We are searching for survivors. We picked up 120 men and are escorting her back to Ulithi.

**04 Nov** - We took aboard 150 men from the Reno. We are now slightly over-complimented. Quite a mad ordeal for the next few days what with being so crowded and the weather being so bad. <sup>2</sup>

**06-24 Nov** - We hung around Ulithi awhile and then went back to Leyte. We were attacked by Jap suicide planes. One carrier was hit, slight damage. Had several severe storms.

**11 Nov** – Left Ulithi to sound uncharted reef reported seen by our aircraft. <sup>2</sup>

**12 Nov** – Bartell <sup>2</sup>



**18 Nov** - Arrived back in Ulithi <sup>2</sup>

**20 Nov** – Midget submarines inside of harbor. One of our tankers was hit and sunk. We spent the day patrolling inside of harbour. Three of these subs were sunk. <sup>2</sup>

**22 Nov** – Left Ulithi for Luzon. <sup>2</sup>

**26 Nov** – Carried out air strikes against Manila with usual M action against enemy. <sup>2</sup>

**29 Nov** - Pull into Ulithi.

**02 Dec** – Arrived back in Ulithi. <sup>2</sup>

**03 Dec** - Some baby Jap subs snuck into the harbor last night and torpedoed a tanker. We were sent out to hunt for them, no results. However, three were sunk by other tin cans.

**07 Dec** – Left Ulithi again for Luzon. <sup>2</sup>

**09 Dec** - Left port. Refueled.

**10 Dec** - On our way to Luzon to support a paratroop landing on Mindoro.

**11 Dec** - Refueled.

**13 Dec** - We were attacked once today. No damage.

**15 Dec** - A combined air and amphibious landing this morning on Mindoro.

**16 Dec** - A night fighter off one our carriers crashed. We found him in about 45 minutes. He was almost done.

**15-16-17 Dec** – Three destroyers and one destroyer escort were sunk during storm. Very, very few survivors. Although we patrolled the area for three days we picked up only one man. [Thomas Stealey] The Cogswell took a 52 degree roll at one time and on another occasion we shipped water on the bridge. This was the first time I have actually been scared since coming out here.<sup>2</sup>

**17-19 Dec** - Can't refuel, too rough. This is the worst storm we have been in. We are running low on fuel, but can't do anything about it. We can't steer our course, the seas are too big. The big ships are taking a beating. The storm is finally over, it took a heavy toll. Numerous men were lost overboard from our group. The USS Hull capsized and only 10 survivors picked up so far. The USS Spence capsized and no survivors as yet. We along with the Knapp were detailed to look for survivors.

**20 Dec** - Our cans picked the captain, 5 officers and 30 men from the Hull. We searched all night. Many cries and whistles were heard by other ships. This morning we picked up one man [Thomas Stealey] who was in the water since the storm with only life jacket. He said he was with nine other men but doesn't know what happened to them. He was off the destroyer Hull.

**21 Dec** - We have just learned that at least one other destroyer and possibly two others turned over in the storm. Several DEs and tugs were lost.

**22 Dec** - On our way back to Ulithi last night after midnight we heard a call for help, we searched all night but didn't find him. We could have ran him down as we were making 25 knots.

The following article, furnished by H. Brady, appeared in the VFW December 1944 Newspaper:

### **Typhoon Cripples Third Fleet-**

Among them, the destroyers Spence, Hull and Monaghan had earned 30 WWII battle stars, from Pearl Harbor to the Philippine Sea. As part of the Third Fleet, they had the JAPANESE on the run and in disarray by late 1944. But these three warships were about to face their fiercest and final battle.

As the fleet prepared for the invasion of Luzon, Philippines, on Dec. 17, an approaching storm hindered refueling efforts. The U.S. ships moved northwest to evade the tropical disturbance, which was only 300 miles to the east, then changed course again to the southwest. But the storm - now reaching typhoon strength and only 150 miles away - seemed to be stalking them.

With winds topping 110 knots and monstrous waves pitching them back and forth, the ships were helpless. Planes and vehicles broke free of lashings, tossed in to piles like discarded toys.

The three destroyers were especially vulnerable. With fuel bays near empty, their massive guns and ammunition made them dangerously top heavy. With every broadside, the Hull, Spence and Monaghan were thrown on their sides. Seawater rushed in, shorting out electricity and flooding engine rooms. Tragically, all three destroyers sank, trapping most of the crew.

Of 250 crewmen aboard the Monaghan, only six survived, only 24 of 325 from the Spence, and 62 of 250 on the Hull.

Mother Nature had unleashed her full might on the Third Fleet, claiming 790 lives, damaging 21 ships(nine put out of action)and destroying 150 planes.

Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz said the Typhoon," represented a more crippling blow to the Third Fleet than it might be expected to suffer in anything less than a major action."

Veterans who lost their lives in the typhoon of 1944 had stood up to everything the Japanese had thrown at them, and came away victorious. But they were helpless against this ocean fury.

**24 Dec** - Entered Ulithi. Received 45 bags of mail, a lot of packages. It will seem more like xmas.

**2 Jan 1945** - Refueled. Going to strike Formosa tomorrow. It is a little cooler up here, about 70 degrees.

**3 Jan** - Our planes have gone in. we are only about 70 miles off the coast.

**5 - 8 Jan** - Steaming SW, heading for the China sea.

**9 Jan** - We are approaching the straights leading into the ChinA Sea.

**11 Jan** - Refueled.

**12 Jan** - Our planes made air strikes on the French-Indo-China coast. We are about 35 miles away. The Jap navy already left. The seventh fleet has been taking quite a few air strike and have suffered some ships damaged. The weather is cool and very rough. We have been passing a lot of dead Japs in the water. We stopped and pick up two for some papers. They have been in the water about two weeks.

**13 Jan** - Refueled from tanker. The Japs have yet to come out and attack us.

**14 - 16 Jan** - Our planes attacked Hong Kong, Canton and many other enemy held posts.

**17 - 19 Jan** - In the China sea, we are rocking and rolling in a big storm. The other day the Japs started to attack us but broke off.

**20 - 21 Jan** - Dashing back through the straights for the Pacific side. After getting through to the Pacific we were attacked for about five hours by Jap planes. None our ships suffered any damages. Heading for Formosa.

**22 Jan** Yesterday about 12:30 pm two Jap planes snuck into our formation. One a Bonzai Joe plane and crashed on the Ticonderoga. The other dropped a bomb on the Langley, which didn't go off. The Ti was burning very badly when more planes attacked and another Bonzai crashed on her. Flames leaped hundreds of feet into the air. After three hours of constant attack, the Ti put out her fire and was listing to her port side about 10 degrees. Approximately 18 planes were shot down around the formation and many more shot down by our planes further out. The Captain the Exec of the Ti were badly wounded and many more killed and wounded. The Maddox was hit by 100 pound bomb and a Bonzai crashed on deck. We are underway escorting the TI and M back to port.

**28 Jan** - Arrived Ulithi. The good news is that we are going back to the states as our engines are pretty shaken and need a lot of repairs.

**19 Feb** - Arrived in the states, finally.

**19 Apr** - Heading back out. Only 30 men missed ship. It's a wonder that whole ship didn't jump. At last Lt Shelton (?) has left. Things should go much better for everyone. How one man could be so lousy and mean is beyond ...

**19 Apr** – Left San Diego for Pearl Harbor <sup>2</sup>

**21 Apr** – Bartell <sup>2</sup>

April 21, 1945

Dear Folks,

Well I suppose Cile is back by now and has told you about the time that we had. Did she tell you that I put on weight while in the states. Ah, that was good duty.

What's the latest news from Joe and Les. I hope that I will be able to see Joe this time out. Believe me if its possible I sure will.

It's getting warmer already so I suppose that we'll have to put away the jackets that they gave until we hit cooler climate. Their pretty good jackets too - fur lined.

We have quite a few new men aboard to take the place of those transferred or over-the-hill. Our executive officer is now the captain and all in all the old Cogs is almost like a new ship.

I guess that I'll have to wash and press my tailor-mades and store them away cause it'll be some time before I use them again. Lester ought to buy himself a set cause they look and feel much nicer than the regulations. He'd look good in them too because he's tall and thin.

Say Dad if you happen to run across a set of small pattern files that aren't working would you give them to Cile so that she can send them to me. They come in handy repairing stuff like watches and gauges and things like that. Has Mr. Mueller moved as yet. He said that he was thinking of it when we were over there.

Well, I'll close now so take it easy and give my regards to all.

**24 Apr** - Hit Pearl Harbor. We are not going back with the fleet. Instead, our division has been assigned picket duty off Okinawa, which is rough. Destroyers have been getting hit at the rate off one a day. So far 16 have been sunk and thirty damaged at Okinawa.

**25 Apr** – Arrived Pearl Harbor <sup>2</sup>

**27 Apr** - Left Pearl Harbor and heading for Ulithi.

**02 May** - Left Pearl Harbor for Ulithi <sup>2</sup>

**08 May** - Celebrated V-E day at sea. <sup>2</sup>

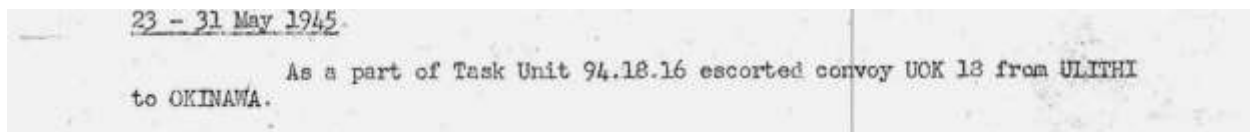
**14 May** - Arrived in Ulithi. Same old hole. <sup>2</sup>

**15 May** - Arrived Ulithi. There are many banged up destroyers from Kamikazes at Okinawa.

**19 May** - Left Ulithi with convoy heading for Okinawa.

**23 May** - Left Ulithi with 15 ship convoy with reinforcements for Okinawa. <sup>2</sup>

**23-31 May** – Statement of actions and campaigns participated in <sup>3</sup>



**29 May** - Arrived off of Okinawa but could not enter because of our raids on harbor <sup>2</sup>

**29 May** - Arriving entrance to Okinawa this morning and no sooner did we get there our group was hit by six Kamikazes. All were shot down but one just missed the transport that the nurses were on. First one missed her by inches and the other just missed the fantail.

**30 May** - Entered harbor. Some 40 odd cans beached because of Jap attacks <sup>2</sup>

**01 Jun** - Going out on picket duty with the Caperton and another DD. We will be about 40 miles north of Okinawa. Our duty is to intercept approaching planes from the Kyushu a Kamikaze base. The Caperton and also another DD are going along. Also three small LCIs are coming along to pick up survivors in case we are hit or sunk. Doesn't make you feel good! A picket ship lasts about 18 hours before it is hit or sunk. We are to stay 3 days, if we last that long.

**01 Jun** - Assigned to picket duty. Oh oh. Feel like drawing up will. <sup>2</sup>

**01-26 Jun** - Statement of actions and campaigns participated in <sup>3</sup>

1 - 26 June 1945.

In company with other destroyers performed radar picket duty to the north of OKINAWA. On 3 June was under enemy air attack, several enemy planes being knocked down by CAP and ships' gunfire. Two enemy planes made suicide attacks on formation, both missing. Under enemy air attack the night of 8 June. On 9 June enemy plane made suicide attack on formation, hitting and sinking the U.S.S. Wm. D. PORTER. On 11 June, while again under enemy air attack, LCS 122 was hit by suicide plane, setting her afire and causing considerable damage, but not sinking her. One other enemy plane knocked down by ships' gunfire. On night of 16 June were under bombing attack by enemy planes while anchored in HAGUSHI Anchorage, bombs dropping close enough aboard to scatter fragments on ship. On 21 June while at anchor in KERAMA RETTO, anchorage was attacked by suicide planes, U.S.S. CURTISS and U.S.S. KENNETH WHITING suffering hits. On 26 June as a part of Task Unit 31.29.24 proceeded to LEYTE.

**02 Jun** - Well it final happened. On the twentieth hour first two of them came in on our starboard side. Our CAP (combat air patrol) got one but the other started in on us. We hit him before he reached us and he tried to crash into a LCI but missed by a matter of feet. A few minutes later a VAL was spotted directly over the Caperton which is five hundred yards off our port bow. He dove and just missed by inches. I bet they all aged 10 years. Another came in and just missed their fantail.

**03 Jun** - Returned to Okinawa.

03 Jun - On picket duty now for three days with two other cans. The three of us and four small LCSs (along to pick up survivors) accumulated 22 planes for this afternoon. These guys mean business. Could hear the near misses exploding down in engine room. <sup>2</sup>

04 Jun - Relieved to fuel, and take on ammunition. <sup>2</sup>

**05 Jun** - Returned to picket duty. A couple more DDs were hit.

**05 Jun** - Anchored - work all day and half of night taking on fuel, ammo and chow. <sup>2</sup>

**06 Jun** - The Kamikazes raised hell last night. We spent most of the night at GQ. Our ship shot down two more last evening. After dark one Jap plane passed in-between the Caperton and us at about 40 feet off the water. No one fired as we didn't think he knew we were there.

**06-07 Jun** - Still anchored. Today (6th) they towed in the destroyer who relieved us with both a torpedo and a suicide plane in her. Anchorage under night attack. <sup>2</sup>

**07 Jun** - The Caperton was relieved by the USS Porter. About 2 hours later the Porter was about 500 yards off our starboard bow was hit by one suicide plane. She sank, there were no casualties. [*Porter was hit and sank on 10 June*]

**8 Jun** - We're back in at anchor in Wise Man's cove at Okinawa. The anchorage was raided this morning.

**08 Jun** - Here we go again for picket duty. Hope the luck holds out. <sup>2</sup>

**9 Jun** - The Japs came over again about 4am. The anchorage was covered with smoke and the raiders just dropped their bombs. One small landing craft was blown apart right off our bow. A near miss knocked some men around on our bridge. Shrapnel sprayed the ship.

09 Jun - On picket station with 5 cans this time. G.Q most of time. <sup>2</sup>

**10 Jun** - Went out on picket duty. The Japs are using wood planes and they are hard to pickup on radar.

10 Jun - At 0815 this morning the USS Porter hit and sank with out casualties (boy what luck.) So far we've had a lot of shrapnel on our decks, but no one hurt. <sup>2</sup> [*The correct date of the Porter's sinking*]

**11 Jun** - About 150 suicide planes came last night but couldn't find us, thank God.

11 Jun - Still afloat. Shot down two planes (suicide). One went down in flames just over mast and landed on one of the LCS's in back of us. Heavy casualties but she didn't sink. <sup>2</sup>

**12 Jun** - Back in the cove. A ship rear of us got hit by a suicide. About four ships were hit in about one minute.

**12 Jun** - Relieved again. <sup>2</sup>

**13 Jun** - Anchored. Can see them fighting at southern tip. <sup>2</sup>

**14 Jun** - Back on picket duty. Rumor has it that the Japs are using something called a flying torpedo, called a "BAKA" Bomb. It is released from a heavy high flying bomber and the suicide pilot aims it. It takes one man to operate it.

14 Jun - Supplies all day. <sup>2</sup>

**15 Jun** - Last night we were attacked three times and came out without a scratch.

**15 Jun** - Fueled. Jap bombers over anchorage. Several near misses straddled. Some of bay out by shrapnel. <sup>2</sup>

**16 Jun** - Back in the cove.

**16 Jun** - Out on picket duty again. USS Twig hit and sunk by torpedo while on route. <sup>2</sup>

**17 Jun** - Some of the Japs that are still loose on the islands swim out to the ships at night and attack the guards on them. The Captain and Comm. Officer on the destroyer behind us were knifed to death last night. Our night watch took some shots at Japs swimming out from the beach.

**17-18 Jun** - Many bogies but we now have air coverage and none very close. <sup>2</sup>

**20 Jun** - Under attack several times the past couple days. We shot down one plane.



**20-21 Jun** – Anchored <sup>2</sup>

**22 Jun** - Anchored in main harbor at dusk. One Jap plane dived into seaplane tender USS Curtis but did not sink it. <sup>2</sup>

**24 Jun** - Went to a new picket station. Three ships were sunk yesterday.

**24 Jun** - Underway for picket duty again. One little LCS shot down 9 planes last night. That's shooting. <sup>2</sup>

**25 Jun** - Our luck is still holding out. Several planes were hunting for us last night but didn't see us. One passed just 200 feet from us. We had to come to a standstill so he wouldn't see our wake. I'm glad no one got an itchy finger or we'd have been dead ducks.

**25 Jun** - Still out on picket duty. CAP got 20 planes. We got one and other ships got 10. <sup>2</sup>

**26 Jun** - Bogies all night but did not fire for fear of being seen. Relieved and assigned to go back to the carrier task force 38. <sup>2</sup>

**27 Jun** - Underway for Leyte. <sup>2</sup>

**27-28 Jun** - Our planes found part of Jap fleet in Kobe Naval base and are giving it hell. <sup>2</sup>

**28 Jun** - We are leaving Okinawa to rejoin the Fleet.

**29 Jun** - Arrived in Leyte. Official report on the Okinawa deal: 233 sunk and 1037 damaged. <sup>2</sup>

**30 Jun** - Arrived Leyte.

**01 Jul** - Underway to join the Third Fleet under Adm. "Bull" Halsey.

01-10 Jul - Underway with CT group: 20 carriers, 12 BB, 20 Cruisers, 72 destroyers for Tokyo. Fueled, supplies, ammo at sea. <sup>2</sup>

**01 July – 15 August** - Statement of actions and campaigns participated in <sup>3</sup>

1 July to 15 August 1945

As a part of Task Force 38 and Third Fleet, took part in a series of air strikes against JAPANESE home islands (Tokyo Area - KURE-KOBE Area - Northern HONSHU - HOKKAIDO).

**03 Jul** - Steaming north. Rumors have that we are going to attack Japan.

**06 Jul** - The first wave of planes took off to attack the Japanese coast.

**10 Jul** - First strikes on Tokyo. Bombarded off and on until 15th. Not much opposition. <sup>2</sup>

**11-16 Jul** - Detached to look for lone sub who is laying mines all around us. <sup>2</sup>

**17 Jul** - Strikes (air) Tokyo. Bombarded northern (?). <sup>2</sup>

**18 Jul** - Planes spotted Jap Battle Wagon. Slowly crippling it. <sup>2</sup>

**19-22 Jul** - Out to fuel and provision. <sup>2</sup>

**20 Jul** - Not too much happening. We shot down one plane. Our planes have shot down about 500 planes in the past couple weeks.

**23 Jul** - Left tanker for Tokyo again. This is a snap compared to Okinawa. 50 Jap planes shot down over group on 26th. Our planes raising hell in harbor. <sup>2</sup>

**25 Jul** - We along with the Ingersoll were detached to run some urgent messages to Iwo Jima.

**27 Jul** - We are still 300 miles from the Task Group.

27-28 Jul - Our planes found part of Jap fleet in Kobe Naval base and are giving it hell. <sup>2</sup>

**28 Jul** - Ordered to search for subs that were spotted the other day.

**29 Jul** - I (John Huber) was sure he had the sub on sound gear. However our know it all Sound Officer didn't think so. He said it was too large to be a sub. John thinks he is wrong. See reprint below!

Reprint - "Lt Cmd Hashimoto's ten-month old boat was better equipped and faster than comparable submarines anywhere in the world. Her twin diesels drove her along the surface at almost eighteen knots and her deadly oxygen-powered torpedoes were the envy of navies everywhere. Quite simply, the Japanese I-class submarine was a weapon not to be ignored".

29-30 Jul - Laid off Tokyo, but no strikes. Peace rumors. <sup>2</sup>

**01 - 10 Aug** - Rejoined fleet. Still making strikes along the Japanese coast. Refueling as needed.

**01-04 Aug** - Rendezvous with tanker. <sup>2</sup>

**05 Aug** - Bartell<sup>2</sup>

Dear Folks,

August 5, 1945

I hope that this letter finds you well and good. I'm okay and everything is about the same out here. Some times it's hot but just now is real cool and everything is as rosy as it can be. Not much excitement lately and darned if they can make me mad about that.

I haven't heard from Joe or Les for some time now so I suppose that they are on the move again. I did get a letter from Don Franchauer. He doesn't seem to like the Navy very well. He and about a million other guys. He says that they are starting on a shakedown cruise. I'll bet that they end up out here before hitting the states again. That's just a guess though. He'll get to love it.

Seeing as how we are not too busy just now we are making a washing machine for ourselves. It will be a reciprocating job, run by compressed air with a funnel on the end of it sticking into a forty-millimeter box. We've got lots of compressed air and lots of dirty clothes so I guess it will work okay.

How's everything going at the shop now. I guess that you are plenty busy yet. Cile says that E Knight was laid off at the Union Fork and Hoe. Are things beginning to slack up down there.

That was sort of funny about Jackie staying over there wasn't it. He must be nuts or something. Maybe he has his reasons though.

I see that as usual Bill passed in school with flying colors. Quite a kid him. Has he been using the ball glove much.

Well I'll close now with all my love. Take care of yourselves.

**08 Aug** - Russia in. <sup>2</sup>

**09 Aug** - Air strikes again. One destroyer hit. <sup>2</sup>

**10 Aug** - Air strikes. <sup>2</sup>

**11 Aug** - Rendezvous tankers <sup>2</sup>

**12 Aug** - The other day a B-29 dropped an Atomic Bomb on Japan [*Hiroshima – 06 August*]. We were told that it burned the whole city.

**12 Aug** - Escort Independence to Iwo Jima. <sup>2</sup>

**14 Aug** - Another B-29 dropped an Atomic Bomb [*Nagasaki – 09 August*]. We were over 400 miles away from the first one and we heard it. Today we were only 100 miles away.

**14 Aug** - Returned to group with Indianapolis. <sup>2</sup> [*Not possible as Indianapolis was sunk on 30 July 1945*]

**15 Aug** - Thank God they, the Japanese want to surrender. California here we come.

**15 Aug** - Air strikes <sup>2</sup>

**16 Aug** - Our carriers launch planes for another strike on Japan. Just before dropping bombs they were told to return to their carriers. About 11am a message came over the radio from the Flag Ship, to "cease fire, the war is over".

**16-27 Aug** - Cruising off Japan. <sup>2</sup>

**16 Aug – 23 Aug** - Statement of actions and campaigns participated in <sup>3</sup>

16 - 23 August 1945  
As a part of Task Force 38 and Third Fleet, steamed in general area southeast of HONSHU awaiting surrender developments.

**21 Aug** – Japanese newspaper Asahi Shinban article received by George Overman from a friend in Japan who found this in a library. Translation below.<sup>1</sup>



Asahi Newspaper, Japan, August 21 1945:

Headline Adm. Nimitz's headquarters announce U.S. Fleet Task Force plans military operations around Japan islands.

23 - 26 August 1945.

Cleared Task Group 38.4 with other units and formed Task Group 35.1 as Support Force for the occupation of the TOKYO area. Continued to steam in general area southeast of HONSHU awaiting surrender developments.

**27-29 Aug** – Entered Sagami Wan. <sup>2</sup>

**27 Aug – 02 September** - Statement of actions and campaigns participated in <sup>3</sup>

27 August to 2 September 1945.

At 1130 on 27th passed O SHIMA to port and entered SAGAMI WAN. Task Group 30.1 (MISSOURI with ComThirdFlt) and Task Group 30.2 (DUKE OF YORK with Com BritPac) ahead of our group. Proceeded along westward side of SAGAMI Wan then east along north shore to avoid possible minefield and show the Japs ashore we were here in force and to stay. At 1430 anchored in SAGAMI WAN. Looming to the west was Mt. FUJIYAMA. At sunset the once "rising sun" of Japan set behind FUJI, a fitting symbol and climax to her setting sun of destiny as of this historic day. DesDiv 100 was assigned to Fire Support Group TG 35.3. Continued at anchor on the 28th and 29th and in Condition I throughout daylight in preparation for any act of treachery, but no enemy reaction of any kind was experienced. On ENO Island, a few hundred yards from the berths of DesDiv 100, two new cave emplacements containing twin guns were uncomfortably visible at point blank range. However, a white flag flew overhead which aroused suspicion but up to this point was apparently sincere. On 30th got underway to take screening stations for cruiser fire support group (Task Group 35.3) composed of QUINCY, CHICAGO, SPRINGFIELD, BOSTON, WILKES-BARRE, and ST. PAUL. This group took stations along eastern shore of SAGAMI WAN to cover entry of Task Force

31 into TOKYO BAY and in support of YOKOSUKA landings. There was no opposition and no fire against shore targets was necessary. On 31 August set normal condition of readiness. Assigned to radar picket stations in SAGAMI WAN. No evidence of unfriendly acts on the part of the Japs. Strong forces anchored in TOKYO BAY and ashore at YOKOSUKA. On 2 September 1945 anchored in TOKYO BAY with units of the THIRD Fleet, including the U.S.S. MISSOURI, aboard which the formal articles of surrender of JAPAN to the ALLIES was signed by Japanese Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu for Japan; Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, USN for the United States, and General of the Army, Douglas MacArthur, USA, for the United Nations.

**29 Aug** - Well, we made it and it is great to be alive.

In a few days we are going into Tokyo Bay.

Note: The USS Cogswell DD651 was one of a group of warships, who first entered Tokyo Bay, (There were three Japanese war ships leading the flotilla in the event of mines.

**30 Aug** – Covered first landing. <sup>2</sup>

**31 Aug** – On patrol duty. <sup>2</sup>

**02 Sep** – Cogswell pushed on into Tokyo Bay 02 September for the surrender ceremonies. <sup>2</sup>



**01 Oct** – Discharged <sup>2</sup> [*Date estimated*]

**25 Nov** - (approx.) The Cogswell escorted several troop ships into Korea. Ran into a terrible typhoon. Many men got sick. Missed Turkey dinner. Lost one troop ship that hit a mine... many men lost.

Summary - USS Cogswell DD 651, participated in 12 major battles. Our ship shot down 24 planes, assisted in sinking a Cruiser. Four other surface vessels were sunk by gun fire or torpedo.

Stayed in Japan until Dec 1945. Returned to the states (Westcoast) by Xmas.

Left for Boston via the Canal in Jan 1946.

# ADDITIONAL NOTES

EASTER 1944

While on patrol off the Marshall Islands, The crew was told to put on dress whites for Captain's Inspection and attended mass. After dinner shifted back to dungarees and got back to the war.

EARLY SUMMER 1944

While steaming with Task Force 5.8, a flight of light bombers approached the formation, low on the water. They were within sight when the GQ alarm sounded. All guns trained on the approaching planes. Our gunnery officer Evans Hughes III said, "They look like B25s, hold your fire", we did, but two other DDs opened fire and shot down two planes. They were US B25s.

MID-SUMMER 1944

Do you remember the incident and know who done it?

Later in Espiritu Santos, the ship was in a nest along a pier, When our signalman sneaked aboard the USS Ingersoll & USS Knapp and painted a US Flag on their stacks.

Commander Chillingworth was fit to be tied. But never found out who done it.

JAN 1947

Prior to the Cogswell being placed in mothballs, at Charleston, SC Jan 1947, the ship had three commanding officers.

Captain Harold Thomas Deutermann, USN, put the ship in commission in 1943. He was affectionately known as the "Flying Dutchman" throughout the fleet.

The second Commanding Officer of the Cogswell was Captain Robert Elmore Lockwood, USN, reporting on board October 11, 1944.

Commander Reuben Noel Perley, Jr., USN, whose rank was Lt. Cmd at the time, relieved Commander Lockwood in April 1945. He had been Executive Officer of the Cogswell since commissioning.

The U.S.S. Cogswell, remained in Charleston, until early 1951, when she was ordered to be recommissioned.

## THE COGSWELL "SAILS" AGAIN

The crew of the Cogswell that was eventually to put her into commission at Naval Base Charleston, SC was assembled as early as March 1951. Many members of the original crew can remember bunking on the USS Arcadia AD23 or the USS Tidewater AD31 before our ship was ready for occupancy. Finally, during the middle of May 1951, the crew was brought aboard; who would, in the short period of three months take the newly re-activated ship out to sea again. The actual commissioning or re-commissioning ceremonies took place on 7 June 1951. Along with the USS Clarence K Bronson DD668 we made our official entry, into the Atlantic Fleet.

Approximately three months, and two sea trials later, the Cogswell was on its way steaming out of Charleston to Norfolk. After a brief stay at Norfolk the Cogswell was on its way to Newport, her home port. At Newport all final preparations were to be made for the shakedown cruise to Cuba. Also the members of the original crew will remember the first major inspection after recommissioning was held during this time in Narragansett Bay.

It was not until early September that we arrived at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba for our shakedown cruise. During the two months to follow the new crew and the long past used equipment was combined to make an effective fighting unit. This time was not entirely a matter of "all work and no play" as we had an opportunity to visit Guantanamo City, Cuba and Port-au-Prince, Haiti.

When these two months of shakedown were over, everyone concerned had accumulated a vast amount of knowledge. The "boots" who had just come on board several months before, were no longer strangers to the ship; and the old timers had picked up some vital information also.

Early 1952 was spent in Charleston, SC again, where all of the material difficulties were to be ironed out before going out to sea again. Everywhere it was found that a recommissioned ship needed a considerable amount of attention to bring the old equipment into tip-top working condition.

Also during this yard period we entered dry-dock for several weeks. This was the first time in approximately five years that the Cogswell had been high and dry in a dry dock.

The first of February 1952, saw the Cogswell on its way for Guantanamo Bay again for her refresher training. At this time all of the kinks were ironed out and the ship was in tip-top operating condition to become a member of the US Atlantic Fleet. During this stay in the Caribbean, we visited Kingston, Jamaica.

17 AUGUST 1952

After returning to the states and operating out of Newport, RI for several months, we are up to our present location in Boston. All of those previous paragraphs are behind us now and only the future with its long cruise is in the minds of all.

We wish to dedicate this anniversary to those men who nine years ago today put the good ship USS Cogswell in the service of Uncle Sam at the Boston Navy Yard and those who served aboard her during World War II. They gave our ship a magnificent wartime history. Thus, on this date, we extend special greetings to Captain H.T. Deutermann, USN; Captain R.E. Lockwood, USN; Commander R.N. Perley, Jr. USN; and the men who served under their command.

### CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE ON 9TH ANNIVERSARY

A ship is a living thing in the hearts of the men who form her crew. She comes alive as her abilities increase and as her reputation grows. But before the ship can live, the crew must be born of the mass of strangers who first assemble to commission her as a ship. She cannot live only in the spirit and vitality of her crew, and she can grow strong only through the achievements of these men working as a unit.

A little more than a year ago we stood together to dedicate this ship to the service of the United States. I spoke to you of the past and of the future, but my words had meaning only in hope because there was not yet a crew. Today those words have meaning because you have made those hopes come alive. You are now a band of brothers. You are a crew that has been welded by mutual confidence, by common experiences, and by a growing pride in your accomplishments, and today she is a vital and living entity in the hearts of each of us.

On this ninth anniversary of her first commissioning we should take a moment to appreciate her heritage. She has taken her place in the fleet on her second commission the equal of any ship afloat today. It is proper that we should study her past so her complete story can be known by all of us. We should take the time to learn her past achievements and of the fine men who made her live before.

As we prepare for our first big operations we should look back to the men for whom she named, We should know her former Captains who took her through the test of battle. We should bridge the gap between her past and present to make her more vital in our hearts through a full knowledge of her distinguished past.

### PREVIOUS HISTORY

This Anniversary marks a significant date in the history of the Cogswell. In addition, it is also an appropriate time to take stock of and learn a bit more about the ship.



In 1943, the Bath Iron Works Corporation, Bath, Maine was turning out new destroyers at the rate of one every 15 days. On 5 June 1943, the U.S.S. Cogswell DD651 was the tenth destroyer of the year to be launched. On the 17th of August 1943, she was placed in commission at Boston, Ma.

The Cogswell, a 2,050 ton destroyer, was named for both the late Rear Admiral James K. Cogswell and his son, the late Captain Francis Cogswell, USN. Her overall length- 376 feet with a 40 foot beam.

During World War II, the Cogswell saw combat in 12 Star operations; all in the Pacific waters. She is credited with shooting down many enemy planes, sunk four surface crafts and assisted in sinking two large man-of-wars.

The Cogswell's battle stars on the Asiatic Pacific Area Service ribbons were awarded for her participation in many operations (Marshall Islands, Asiatic Pacific raids; Hollandia; Marianas; Western Caroline Island; Leyte; Luzon; Okinawa; Third Fleet Operation against Japan; etc.). In all these operations the Cogswell suffered neither personnel casualties nor any major damage to the ship.

By directive dated January 1947, the Cogswell was to be placed out of commission, in reserve, attached to the U.S. Atlantic Reserve Fleet at Charleston, SC.

In a few short days the Cogswell will again depart for distant duty; she will again be representative of the power of our great nation.

Reluctantly she awakened from her four year nap to again serve her country in troubled times. She is no longer a new ship, but after the face-lifting of Charleston, the calisthenics of Guantanamo Bay, and the regular exercises and study diet of Newport, she has become an even stronger and better looking member of the Atlantic Fleet society. We, who remain of the original crew since recommissioning in June of 1951, have progressed step by step with her. Some of us had many of the same experiences she did in 43 through 45. We too had a four year nap which was rudely interrupted by the clatter of war. Our faces were lifted and our bodies built right along with her. Many of us were new, not only to the Cogswell, but to military life. We had the advantage of not having to be rebuilt and nourished, but we followed the stages of progress and today, we too, are ready. Our gripes are many, but our troubles few. With the rebuilding of the fleet with ships and men like ours we have proved that our strength did not die in 45. We are awake now....

The USS Cogswell bears the name of a family long associated with conspicuous service in the United States Navy. The ship was named in honor of Rear Admiral James K. Cogswell, USN, and his son Captain Francis Cogswell, USN.

Rear Admiral Cogswell was a native of Wisconsin and entered the Naval Academy in 1863. When a Lt. Cmdr. he was aboard the USS Oregon during the historic dash around Cape Horn to join the North Atlantic Squadron in time to contribute to the destruction of the Spanish Fleet at Santiago in 1898, during the Spanish-American War. For eminent and conspicuous conduct in that decisive battle he was promoted to commander. Rear Admiral Cogswell died in Florida in 1908.

His son, Captain Francis Cogswell, was born in Portsmouth, NH, and was appointed to the Naval Academy from that state in 1903. During World War I, Captain Cogswell was awarded the Navy Cross for extraordinary heroism. He died at Bremerton, Washington in 1939.

Co-sponsors of the launching of Cogswell in 1943 were Mrs. Donald C. Bingham, daughter of the late Rear Admiral Cogswell and wife of a Navy Captain; and Mrs. Francis Cogswell, widow of the late Captain Francis Cogswell.

Lieutenant James Kelsey Cogswell, III, USNR, was a "plank owner" at the commissioning of the Cogswell and served aboard her throughout World War II. He won a citation for his part in the demilitarization of Japan. Then LTJG Cogswell organized a fleet of Japanese tugs manned by Japanese crews to service the US Fleet during their first weeks in Tokyo Bay.

## PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL

Portland's harbor line at Willamette River seawall will take on the look of a major naval installation and SW Broadway can be expected to become "Fleet Street" when the city is inundated with a sea of white hats Wednesday and Thursday with the arrival of the largest Rose Festival fleet in history.

Flagship for the 13 vessels scheduled to arrive, including 11 U.S. Navy ships and two Canadian destroyers, will be the guided-missile cruiser Providence. Commanding the contingent of U.S. vessels will be Vice Adm. Lawson P. Ramage, commander of the 1st Fleet.

SKIPPER of the Providence, Capt. Charles H. Tisdale Jr. is a native Portlander and a graduate of Lincoln High School. His mother, Mrs. C. H. Tisdale, and sister, Virginia, reside at 912 SW Vista Ave. He was a 1943 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md.

In addition to the Providence, the 1966 Rose Festival Fleet will include the attack transport Montrose; repair ship Hector; submarine Redfish; a patrol boat, two destroyers, Cogswell and one other; minesweepers.

The Canadian destroyers are the Qu'Appelle and Yukon.

The Coast Guard cutter Yocona, originally scheduled to join the fleet for the Portland visit, has been assigned to survey the Russian fishing fleet off the Pacific Coast.

Adm. Ramage, commanded the 1965 Rose Festival Fleet aboard the cruiser St. Helens.

The destroyer Cogswell spent time on combat duty in Viet Nam. During last deployment, Cogswell served as harbor defense ship at Da Nang, carried out gun fire support missions.

Royal subjects turned out 11,372 strong at Memorial Coliseum Monday evening for selection of 1966 Rose Festival Queen, Julia Ann West, 17-year-old Grant High School senior, was crowned queen at finale. Twelve princesses completed for crown. Each girl gave two-minute speech prior to selection. Princesses then gathered on circular stage in center of Coliseum arena for final appearance before audience and judges.

When the USS Cogswell made its last trip to the Portland Rose Festival in the mid-sixties, prior to being transferred to the Turkish Navy, the Portland unit of the Sea Cadets requested a name change from the USS Enterprise Division to the USS Cogswell Division. The name change was granted in 1965 and a warrant was issued in the name of the USS Cogswell Division by the National Headquarters of the NSCC. The USS were dropped from all unit designators to eliminate confusion with US Navy units in the late seventies.
2. The unit grew to a strength of over 300 youths and under the command of LCDR Dan Haines had the honor of being selected as the top unit in the United States in 1972. After the Viet Nam Era the unit and the entire national program went through major changes and strength dropped off.
3. I am very pleased to report that IG Inspection results for the training year of 1989 placed the Division at the top of the Northwest Region, ahead of 11 other NSCC units.

## MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

**Fall of 1943-** Do you remember when the Cogswell was plane guard for the Enterprise, she picked up a pilot who crashed during flight operations. Captain Deuterman traded him back to the carrier for a case of toilet paper, which the Cogswell ran out of. War is hell..

**In 1944-** The Cogswell crossed the Equator and the International date line at the same time. Proper ceremonies were observed and certificates issued to the crew.

**October 9-10, 1944-** Do you recall or perhaps you were there.

The "Heavy Seas" of October 9-10 1944, Caused many injuries on the Cogswell. Nine of the men suffered injuries requiring extended medical treatment.

Four of which were serious enough to be transferred to the USS South Dakota for more acute medical attention. The USS South Dakota reported that, Seaman 1st Class Noble Hundley died later as a result of his injuries.
