President's Letter Branson Outlook



As many of you know, this program is named after the person who was instrumental in finding a large number of crewmembers who have joined the USS Cogswell DD-651 Association. I was one of those crewmembers located by Don Miller when he called me on a Sunday afternoon many years ago. It is calculated that Don located somewhere near 500 crewmembers during his "searching days."

Don was also the first president of the Cogswell Association founded by Chad White. Don served dutifully in this capacity until 1999, when Frank Wille took over the helm.

The original Don Miller SLP was designed to reward individuals for locating our missing crewmembers. We had limited success with this program, so it is time to regroup by developing a new rewards program. We still have over 2000 missing crewmembers that need to be found. The following are the details of the new & improved Don Miller Shipmate Locator Program

- 1. Locate and sign up five new crewmembers get a Cogswell hat.
- 2. Locate and sign up ten new crewmembers get a Cogswell T-shirt.
- Locate and sign up 25 new crewmembers get a Cogswell leather jacket.

By the time you have located and signed up 25 members, you will have a hat, T-shirt, and leather jacket.

Individuals volunteering for this program will have complete responsibility for locating crewmembers on a list provided.

Other than printing out and mailing the membership forms (I will do this) the volunteer will have to do all the calling and any follow up to get the members signed up. We award the "gifts" when membership dues are paid by the new members. I will keep track of this information within our database.

Your committee hopes that this new program will create new interest in finding our missing crewmembers.

Just ask those who have been at reunions where they rekindle friendships they had over 30, 40, or even 50 years earlier. I have never heard anyone say they were unhappy to meet these old friends.

The Reunion Network (TRN)

TRN states their object is to be "The Definitive Source Of Information For The Volunteer Reunion Planner." This organization has been in business for many years and along with providing an excellent reunion planning magazine, they provide Conference Familiarization (ConFam) events. A ConFam allows the reunion planner an opportunity to see what a prospective reunion host city has to offer, so they will bring their respective group to that city for a reunion. In most cases, the people who join the ConFams through TRN are military reunion planners.

I had the opportunity to visit the TRN ConFam in Branson last year, and I was extremely impressed at how the Visitor's Bureau, working with TRN, presented their city. It was apparent to me that the cities which subscribe to TRN's services go out of their way to entice the military reunions to their area. Not only was Branson represented, but several other cities were at the conference exhibiting their information.

Based on this experience, and my talks with other reunion planners at the ConFam, we have decided to focus our efforts on selecting future reunion sights based on cities where the CVB's are members of the TRN service. To some extent this provides us some comfort in the fact that they want our military reunions in their city. Rest assured, this does not limit our ability to plan reunions. There are numerous cities which belong to the TRN service and there is not cost to the Cogswell Association for any TRN service.

The only area which is under represented is the Northwest U.S. This brings us to the issue of our vote for the October 2008 reunion. There are three cities (narrowed down from five) which are eager to host our reunion. Two of these cities are members of TRN. They are Spokane, WA and Boise, ID. The other selection is Portland, OR, which is not a member, but is interested in our reunion. In this newsletter are "brag sheets" from the three 2008 choices. He also leaves behind a sister Janet Laura Luken from Godfrey, IL and her six children, Theresa Eagan of Godfrey, IL, David Skinner of Cocoa, FL, Keith Skinner of Charlotte, NC, Barbara Marshall of St Charles, MO, Michael Skinner of Waynesville, NC and Geof Skinner of Cabden, IL. His wishes were to be cremated. A memorial service will be held in the club house of the Casa Serena Park in a few weeks.

Robert R. Stormont, 68, passed away on Monday November 20, 2006 at the Gulfside Regional Hospice in New Port Richey, Florida. Robert was retired from the railroad. He also served in the Navy. He was born on August 3, 1938 in Francisco. He was preceded in death by his father. CREWMEMBER PROFILES

JOHN BARWINCZOK 1951-1952 TE3

John is the youngest of 12 children born to Stephen and Anna Barwinczok. John left high school at the age of 16 to enlist in the service, but had to wait till he turned 17 to enter the United States Navy where most of his sea duty was served in the Mediterranean and North Atlantic.

While home on a short leave, he met Virginia Scolaro. After a whirlwind courtship of three days, they became engaged before John returned to active duty. Ten weeks later he returned to Auburn for another short leave, just long enough for John and Ginny to get married.

John's five year Navy career included being a member of the second Under Water Demolition team, the precursor to the Navy Seals. John also served as Post Master for the 6th Fleet in Europe as well as serving a year on a destroyer. Just prior to his discharge, he and his fellow servicemen received "greetings" from President Truman, canceling all discharges because of the Korean War. This extended his service for another year of duty. While in the service John and Ginny had a daughter, Louise (Wilson).



Upon his discharge, John worked at General Electric as a test technician. After a short time he left to work for the



Department of Defense as well a completing his high school education and attending college. During his 35- year career with the Federal Government, he served in many capacities from inspector to Quality Manager for the Syracuse, New York area. In 1987, John retired from the Government, but found retirement too uneventful, so he formed his own company, JB Quality Consulting, which he ran for nearly 15 years.

After his second retirement, he again became restless and decided to form a Korean War Veterans Association Chapter in Cayuga County. During his tenure, membership grew from 12 to 82 people in two and half years. During the past year his chapter raised in excess of \$43,000 for a Korean War Memorial to honor Cayuga County Veterans. That memorial was dedicated on July 30, 2006 and graces Veterans' Memorial Park in downtown Auburn.

Anyone who knows John, knows that he has to stay busy, so he has participated in various activities and organizations that include:

- Founder and Commander of the Korean War Veterans Cayuga County Chapter 296
- Chairman for the Korean War Memorial project
- Active member of the Italian Heritage Society and the Knights of Columbus
- Co-founder and member of the USS Cogswell Association
- Member of the US Naval Memorial Foundation and the UDT/Seals Museum
- Member of the Veterans of Foreign War, Post 1975 and the American Legion, Post 1324
- Past member and chairman of ASQC, American Society of Quality Control, Syracuse, NY

• Organized and presented seminars and workshops on all aspects of the Dep't. of Defense Quality throughout the northeast

• Community service activities at local VA hospitals and central New York school youth groups Member of the Finger Lakes Ski Club

John and Ginny reside in Auburn, where they have been life long residents. John continues to stay busy traveling, working on his golf game, reading, enjoying the company of his friends and family over a glass of good wine, and working on projects around his home and anyone else's!

JAMES RICHARD NELSON 1958-1961 RM2

As an RM2 on the Cogswell in the spring of '61, I had a decision to make: re-up on a great ship with great

shipmates or pursue my goal of a University education. I chose the latter. In the spring of 1966 a year after getting married, I was recruited at the University of Minnesota for work with the National Security Agency. Six years at NSA living in the Washington DC area was enough for a Minnesota boy, so back to the Midwest. There, with family experience in construction I worked as a custom home builder for a few years until a severe recession hit that business hard.

While at NSA I had pursued a graduate degree in computer science so when the building business went belly-up I returned to computers. In the late 70s I joined Cray Research, the supercomputer company, when there were about 30 employees and stayed with them over 12 years, ending as operations director. The highlight of those years was my work in Hawaii with Neil Armstrong. When I left Cray there were over 3500 employees; it was quite a ride. Moving on I changed direction as a vice president of another company doing work in manufacturing and distribution computer business, Having this experience, I purchased a manufacturing company. A medium-sized company, we did work for the new Mall of America



and the Twin Cities airport along with many local companies. It was a joy to do this work. After a number of years,



however, I became involved with Habitat for Humanity through my church as a volunteer. With my background in home construction, they asked me to join their staff. I did that after closing down the manufacturing business and finding our employees jobs elsewhere.

As construction manager for the seven county metro area here in the twin cities, for the past 13 years I have had the joy to work with committed volunteers and families in need of decent housing. My wife Mary and I spend many vacations around the country and in Europe doing Habitat work with President Carter. I don't plan on retiring. They will just drag me out of here by my boots when the end comes.

Looking back on the years I spent on the Cogswell I fondly remember some of the events we experienced. Of course the rogue-wave near-capsizing was

one. The gooney-birds at Midway, a U-2 taking off vertically over our ship in Manila, New Years Eve underway with everyone 3 sheets to the wind, rough weather refueling near misses, Seattle Sea Fair and the girls, Christmas caroling to ships alongside with our forward gun vertical and wrapped like a candle, having Harmon and Killebrew in our radio shack, Christmases in Japan, and the beautiful trips into Pearl. And, of course, remembering the great shipmates and great crew for those years.

Yup, the choice in '61 was difficult, but the rest of the ride has been great; a little bumpy at times, but great.

A U.S. Navy Admiral was attending a naval conference that included officers from the US, English, Canadian, Australian, and French Navies. At a cocktail reception, he found himself standing with a group of half a dozen or so officers that included personnel from most of the countries. Everyone was chatting away in English as they sipped their drinks but a French Admiral suddenly complained that, whereas Europeans learn many languages, Americans learn only English. He then asked: "Why is it that we always have to speak English in these conferences rather than speaking French?" Without hesitating, the American Admiral replied, "Maybe it's because the Brits, Canadians, Aussies and Americans arranged it so you wouldn't have to speak German." Suddenly the group became very quiet....



Now you never hear of Dave Jones, Shellbacks or Polliwogs, and you never splice the main brace to receive your daily grog. Now you never have to dog a watch or stand the main event. You even tie your lines today - back in my time they were bent. We were all two-fisted drinkers and no one thought you sinned. If you staggered back aboard your ship three sheets to the wind. And with just a couple of hours of sleep you regained your usual luster. Bright-eyed and bushy-tailed - you still made morning muster. Rocks and shoals have long since gone, and now it's the UCMJ. Then the old man handled everything if you should go astray. Now they steer the ships with dials, and I wouldn't be surprised, If someday they sailed the damned things from the beach computerized.
